

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 18.

Some Oldham mills commence a short time movement on Monday. Fresh adhesions to the movement continue. The maximum working time will be four days per week.

BURNLEY, Sept. 18.

The employers generally believe that if there is a strike of cotton operatives it will be brief.

MANCHESTER, Sept. 18.

Public opinion here generally condemns the strike of the operatives. Resolutions were adopted by the Central Committee of the Master's Association yesterday refusing the offer of wages.

LONDON, Sept. 19.

Parnell addressed a great meeting of tenant farmers at Ennis on Sunday, and set forth the line of policy he wished to see carried out in order to secure an early settlement of the land question. The main features of the programme are unanimity of action among the Irish members, independence of all political parties, refusal to pay more than what the tenant considers a fair rent, and social excommunication of any person taking a farm from which another has been evicted for nonpayment of rent.

A Berlin despatch states that Nihilists have determined to change their tactics, and hereafter will devote their movements to political agitation, expecting aid from Poland in case of war between Russia and Austria.

Hanlan had a short spin on the Tyne yesterday. He rowed a clean powerful stroke and his action was much freer than on Thursday. He says he is gradually recovering from the effects of seasickness.

The steamer "Aurora," from Oporto, bound for Southampton, has foundered at sea. Fifty persons were drowned.

BERLIN, Sept. 19.

The North German Gazette, referring to the recent newspaper controversy about Gen. Von Manteuffel's administration in Alsace-Lorraine, says: The German press is badly serving the interests of the country and the general peace by embittered controversy over the government of imperial provinces at a moment when Frenchmen are considering whether they should cease to make their reconquest the central point of French policy.

LONDON, Sept. 18.

A Constantinople despatch to the Telegraph says no protest against the naval demonstration has been telegraphed to the Turkish Diplomatic representatives abroad. The Porte further asks the powers to guarantee that the naval demonstration will not take place if Dulcigno is surrendered. A new note embodying the foregoing has been communicated verbally to the Ambassador of the European Powers here.

LONDON, Sept. 18.

The Paris correspondent of the Times says awaiting a decision of the law courts is merely a method of shelving the decree question until the meeting of the Chambers. The same correspondent telegraphs at midnight: I am able to confirm the report that the Premier DeFreycinet has held his ground. The question will remain intact until the reassembling of the Chambers. The Chamber will decide the fate of the Cabinet, which will remain unchanged until then.

[The correspondent's views have not proved correct, DeFreycinet having resigned.]

NAPLES, Sept. 18.

The British Mediterranean squadron will probably be stationed on the Albanian coast for the winter.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 18.

The British Consul at Von Armenia has telegraphed the British Ambassador that the Kurds have devastated thirteen Armenian villages.

It is reported from Dulcigno that Muslims there threaten to hoist the Italian flag.

RAGUSA, Sept. 18.

The report that Riza Pasha had been assassinated is not confirmed. He had placed himself under the protection of the Albanian league, but the committee of the league condemned him to death, as they feared he might prove treacherous.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.

There will be a regatta in Jamaica Bay, off Rockaway Beach, on Monday and Tuesday, for prizes aggregating \$1,500. Wallace Ross, Lee, Fred Plaisted, Ten Eyck, Kennedy and Riley are entered.

DENVER, Col., Sept. 19.

A fire at East Las Vegas, yesterday, destroyed a whole block, including nearly half of the business portion of the town. 500 people are homeless; loss \$200,000; heavily insured.

Later: Latest advices from East Las Vegas state that the loss from yesterday's fire will probably not exceed \$100,000, as the buildings destroyed were nearly all small and cheap. The number of people rendered homeless will not exceed 200.

NORWICH, Conn., Sept. 19.

Hon. Lafayette S. Foster, ex-U. S. Senator, is dead.

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 19.

An Augusta despatch says the election returns so far as received give Gov. Davis a plurality of about 200 votes. There are still several towns and plantations to hear from, and there are some discrepancies in the returns received by telegraph which make it difficult to ascertain the exact result of the election. It is evident, however, that the vote is close, and it is quite probable that only the official canvass of the returns will decide who is elected.

ACADEMY OF MUSIC.—To-night the Two Orphans, which has been long in preparation, will positively be produced. Mr. Arnold Morris, who gave readings last evening, which proved him to be a most polished artist, has been specially engaged to portray the chivalrous Marquis and the poor cripple. Effects, costumes, and properties will enhance the attractiveness of the drama, for which seats are being secured with unwonted rapidity.

At a meeting of the Law Society of Prince Edward Island, held at the Law Library, in Charlottetown, on Saturday, the 18th day of September, A. D., 1880, convened on occasion of the lamented death of the Hon. Sir Robert Hodgson, Knight, which event occurred at Charlottetown, on the evening of Wednesday, the 15th September, instant. The Hon. John Longworth, Q. C., President of the Society, being called to the chair, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—

Resolved, That the Law Society of Prince Edward Island, assembled together to follow the mortal remains of the late Sir Robert Hodgson, Knight, to their final resting-place, desire to place on record their sympathy with the family of the deceased Knight, in this their recent bereavement, and further to express their high appreciation of the urbanity and efficiency with which, while maintaining the dignity he discharged the duties of the responsible offices of Attorney General and Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island, held by him—the former for a period of over thirty years, and the latter of over twenty years.

During his long and eventful life, it was Sir Robert's privilege and duty to fill at different times nearly all of the more important offices in this Province, the highest of which—the Lieutenant-Governorship, he received at the hands of his Sovereign, as a reward for his long and faithful services, with the universal good will and approval of his fellow countrymen.

The Law Society desire finally to record the profound respect which they entertain for the sterling integrity and uprightness of Sir Robert's character, and their pride that one who so worthily filled so many different responsible positions in his lifetime, and who has died amidst the universal regret and esteem of those in whose midst he lived, was a member of their profession, and for nearly all his long life actively engaged in the practice of the Law.

Ordered, That the foregoing Resolution be entered on the Records of the Society, and that copies thereof be respectfully transmitted by the President to the members of the family of the deceased Knight.
