PC Speaker Says P.E.I. Roads Best In Canada

By NANCY WHITE Addressing the annual meeting of the Queens County Progressive Conservative Association at the community centre last evening, Robert C. Coates, MP for Cumberland County, N.S., drew a large round of applause with an emphatic statement of his opinion of the roads in this province.

"Prince Edward Island has the best highways of any province in the Dominion of Canada," he said.

Mr. Coates' member shared the speaking slots with Queens County MP's Heath MacQuarrie and Hon. J. Angus MacLean.

Noting that there is no province more dependent upon agriculture than P.E.I., Mr. Coates said that one of the main problems of the Liberal government in living up to its "take a stand for tomorrow" slogan was in getting the Hon. Harry W. Hays, minister of agriculture, "to take a stand behind his desk in the House of Commons."

"Mr. Hays is never in Ottawa," he commented.

Mr. Coates conveyed the regret of his province at the traffic accident in which Premier and Mrs. Walter R. Shaw were recently involved, and added his wishes for their speedy recovery.

"We think a lot of Premier Shaw in Nova Scotia," he said. "GRAVEYARD SIGN" He said that since the April election, in a way people have become "gravely disillusioned with the present government," which he termed "unfortunate, incompetent, and often weak-willed."

He said that in the present financial year, Canadian industry "one of the largest deficits in history, and are experiencing cutbacks in a number of areas," citing the country's defense policy as an example of where cutbacks are occurring.

Commenting on how P.E.I. fared at the recent federal-provincial law conference in Ottawa, Heath MacQuarrie, MP, said that "the slice of the tart pie we got was so small it had to be."

Plans were made to organize several interest groups which will get underway early in January.

DOT Wharf Ready in May

Predicting that it will be "the best in Charlottetown", T. Bruce MacLennan, district engineer for the federal department of public works, said yesterday that the new department of transport wharf expected to be completed by the end of May.

Mr. MacLennan said that trucks previously expected in driving the piles had been overcome and that the construction is running smoothly.

He said most of the "deck" of the wharf has been put on, and that the workmen will proceed with pouring the remainder of it throughout the winter.

The wharf will be approximately 600 feet long and measure 300 feet across the outer end, he said.

The rural-urban committee of Rotary brought together for the luncheon meeting of the club at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday a group of men and women, boys and girls who have won high distinction in all branches of agriculture in competition on the provincial-inter-provincial and national level.

Two guest speakers, Stanley Willis, Canadian Plovering Champion, and Mrs. Jean MacRae, Dairy Princess of P.E.I., addressed the meeting.

Mrs. MacRae, who appeared in a white, green and yellow costume, related how she had served the dairy industry at three fairs; the provincial exhibition, Toronto and at the first Atlantic Winter Fair in Halifax. Two days were spent with the visiting Dairy Queen of England and Wales, touring the island visiting farms and milk processing plants.

Mrs. MacRae asserted that the dairy industry was started in this province more by chance than choice, 250 years ago. In 1713, by the treaty of Utrecht the Acadia farmers on the mainland of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick were forced to vacate their farms and find elsewhere. Many crossed Newfoundland Strait to Isle St. Jean, as this province was at that time called and brought with them numerous cattle and this is reputed to be the beginning of the dairy industry of our province," the speaker stated.

"From this humble beginning has developed the basic industry of this island province," she said.

She suggested that in support of Island dairymen "we should make dairy foods daily foods."
