CONCERT AND DISTRIBUTION OF PRIZES.

The entertainment at the Convent de Notre Dame on Wednesday evening was a triumph of good management and careful training. The large Hall in the Upper flat of the building was tastefully decorated—the chief ornament being a semi-circular terrace of white-robed humanity. There was present a large and appreciative audience, including His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown, Rev. James McDonald, Rev. W. J. Hamilton, Rev. Stephen Phelan, Rev. A.
