Blood Donor Clinics Meet With Success

896 Prince Edward Islanders and several visitors to the Province realized the desperate plight of the Blood Transfusion Service in the Province and rallied to its support by registering as donors at the Clinics conducted in six different centres during the week by the Mobile Team from Halifax. Provincial Red Cross officials expressed themselves as extremely gratified with the results although the number collected will leave a balance of just 546 bottles, after the indebtedness to the Maritime Depot is deducted. As the hospitals in the Province are now using approximately 200 bottles per month, the 546 bottles to our credit will hardly last until the Mobile Team returns for the next session of clinics probably sometime in late October or early November.

A great many of the donors reporting at the above mentioned Clinics came from the rural districts surrounding the centres and it is hoped that there will be many more at future clinics since a large number of patients in our hospitals come from the rural areas. In addition to the numbers registered at the Clinics, there were at least an extra 30 people who arrived at the various Clinics after the Team had moved on to the next centre. The week's schedule was a very full one for the Mobile Team and it was impossible for them to remain in any one centre for the times advertised for the different Clinics.

All cokes served to the donors at the Clinics were generously supplied free of charge by J. and T. Morris Co. Ltd. of Charlottetown.

The Mobile Team, under Dr. Russell, left to return to Halifax from Borden early on Friday morning quite pleased with the results of their strenuous four days in the Province.

Motion Made For A New Trial In Watterworth Case

A motion for a new trial has been made on behalf of Wilfred Watterworth, of Montague, recently convicted and sentenced to two years on a theft charge. The charge involved the theft at Cape Spry on June 8 of a gasoline engine and quantity of used rope, the property of Leon Johnston, of Montague.

At the trial before Mr. Justice McGuigan and a jury, Mr. D. L. Mathieson, K.C., moved to quash the indictment on the ground that the Grand Jury did not have before them any evidence where-by a true bill could validly be returned. This motion was denied by the Court.

Breaking And Entering Charges Withdrawn

Six cases were before Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald at Georgetown yesterday afternoon. The first was a Murray Harbour resident who pleaded guilty to having liquor in his possession in a place other than his residence contrary to the Temperance Act. Some evidence was heard and the case adjourned to Monday, Aug. 7 at 2 p. m.

The next case was that of a Peter's Road resident who pleaded guilty to having possession of liquor not purchased at a vendors. He was fined \$25 and costs of \$50, or in lieu of payment sentenced to 30 days in jail.

The next case involved a resident of Abney who pleaded guilty to being intoxicated in a public place. A fine of \$20 and \$8.00 costs or 30 days in jail. A second resident of Abney pleaded guilty to a similar charge and was also fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

Charges against Stewart Sorrey of Montague of breaking and entering and theft at Cape Spry were withdrawn by the crown. The case had been adjourned several times previously.

The last case was that of a woman from Point Pleasant whose case had been adjourned from last week. She was charged under the Temperance Act with having liquor in her possession not purchased at the vendors. She entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$35 and costs of \$11.00, or 30 days in jail.

Mr. S. S. Hessian, K. C. of Montague represented the Crown in all cases. The court adjourned until Monday, Aug. 7 at 2 p. m. at Georgetown.
