Irish Reforms. LONDON, Jan. 3. Lord Randolph Churchill has submitted to the Cabinet a proposition for the reform of the administration of Government in Ireland. The scheme is supported by the Earl of Carnarvon and by Baron Ashbourne. The project involves the abolition of the vice-royalty and castle executive, and the placing of Ireland on the same footing as Scotland.

European Troubles. LONDON, Jan. 3. It is reported that a number of Madhist fanatics have penetrated the British lines at Suakin, and a great fight ensued in the town. A number of English were killed and wounded. The Government has suppressed the report of the affair.

Suffering Seamen. GLOUCESTER, Jan. 3. The fishing schooner Dido arrived to-day with the schooner Maggie Willett of St. John in tow. The Willett had lost her sails and the crew were suffering from exposure.

A Fatal Brawl. TORONTO, Jan. 3. A row occurred last night in Joy's barber shop, in which C. A. Macdonald, of Ottawa, stabbed W. A. Hobbs fatally with a pair of scissors. Macdonald is under arrest.

Burned to Death. PERTH, ONT., Jan. 2. The house of Robert N. Allan was burned this morning early. Mr. Allan and wife were morning to death. They were nearly ninety years of age, and lived alone.

A Suicide. TORONTO, Jan. 2. Adelaide Davis, of Sarnia, who had been betrayed by a commercial traveller and induced to come here, committed suicide by taking carbolic acid.

An Embezzler Returned. NEW YORK, Jan. 3. Frederick Fischer, who absconded, being an embezzler for \$75,000, has returned to New York. He had wasted the money in gambling.

Struck Oil. TORONTO, Jan. 3. By the boring of a well in McGillivray Township, oil was struck. There is excitement over the discovery.
