## CHAMBERLAIN ON THE TRANSVAAL.

### Government Forced Into Present Position.

OWING TO THE TREATMENT  
RECEIVED FROM THE BOERS

Speech By the Colonial Secretary at  
Birmingham.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

BIRMINGHAM, June 27.—Joseph Chamberlain, Secretary of the Colonies, addressing the Unionists of this city last evening reviewed carefully the Transvaal question.

In the course of his speech he said that owing to the enormous military preparations of the Governments of the South African Republic, Great Britain had been compelled to increase the British garrison in Cape Colony and Natal, entailing an additional expenditure of £500,000 annually.

Mr. Chamberlain said the Government had tried to establish friendly relations with President Kruger, but all their advances had been received with contempt.

Four times since independence was granted we have been on the verge of war with the Transvaal. It is erroneous to say that the British Government will draw back now that it has put its hand to the plow.

We hope that the efforts that are being made will lead to an amicable arrangement for Great Britain only desires justice. But there comes a time when patience can hardly be distinguished from weakness, and when moral pressure becomes a force that cannot be continued without loss of self-respect.

I hope that the time may never come in this instance, but if it does Britons will find means to secure a result essential to the peace of South Africa.

The speech was warmly applauded.

In replying to a vote of thanks Mr. Chamberlain said he felt strengthened and encouraged by their confidence and support.

He had spoken from his heart because he believed they had reached a critical turning point in the history of the Empire, and the whole world was watching to see how they would issue from the difficulty.

It is my belief, he said in closing, "that the country will show itself not unworthy of its glorious history and traditions."

### FATAL MISTAKE

Carbolic Acid Administrated in a Mistake for a Harmless Soothing Medicine

St. STEPHEN, N. B., June 25.—Mrs. Wm. Phinney of Milltown, Me., had been visiting her sister, Mrs. (Captain) Andrew B. Martin, at the Lodge, four miles below St. Stephen. About four weeks ago a child was born to her, but it only lived two weeks. Complications followed the mother's confinement, and she has been under medical care, with a nurse in attendance. She awoke at twelve o'clock on Saturday night and called for some soothing medicine that was in a bottle close at hand. The nurse undertook to give it to the sufferer, but made a fatal mistake. The medicine had no sooner entered the patient's mouth than she said that it did not taste right and she did not think it fit for anyone to use. She said no more, but passed into intense spasms of agony, and died in about forty minutes. Dr. Webber was summoned, but life was extinct when he arrived. The nurse had administered carbolic acid in mistake for harmless soothing medicine. Mrs. Phinney was about 22 years of age.

### A RUSSIAN TRAP.

Proposals Regarding Disarmament Not Well Received.

LONDON, June 24.—The correspondent of the Daily News at the Hague says: Several delegates remark that Russia's proposals regarding disarmament contains a trap, since she could increase her troops to any extent in Siberia, which is a colony.

Captain Scheine, the Russian naval expert, laid upon the table a proposal similar to Col. Jikinski's dealing with the navy, but limiting the iron-augmentation period to three years on the ground that three years are enough to build an iron-clad. The correspondent of the Times at The Hague says: There is not the faintest chance of the Russian proposals being adopted, but it is likely that some of them will be carried to the effect; for in the interests of peace and humanity, the conference hopes that, unless an emergency should occur, war budgets will not be increased.

### A Fever Ship.

St. JOHN, June 26.—Steamer Cherone of the Battle line, arrived Saturday, at outer quarantine, from Manchester, with Captain Masters, commodore of the fleet, and third Engineer Golding, sick with typhoid fever. They and the cook were removed to Partridge Island hospital, and the vessel was disinfected. She will come up to her berth Monday morning. Although the vessel cleared at Liverpool, with a clear bill of health, ten of her crew were then in the hospital with typhoid fever, and their places filled by wharf hands. The cause of the disease is attributed to filling the steamer's water tank in the Platte, whence she sailed to Manchester, before her voyage to St. John. Captain Masters is today out of danger, but the third engineer is a very sick man.

### The Avon and Edgehill.

### GREAT BRITAIN FIRM.

The Attitude Appears to be Having a Desired Effect in the Transvaal Complications.

LONDON, June 26.—The firm attitude of Great Britain appears to be having the desired effect in the Transvaal complications. The latest cablegrams from South Africa talk of various semi-official missions for negotiations between Cape Town, Bloemfontein, and Pretoria, aiming to arrange a franchise compromise on a basis of five or six years' past residence. President Kruger is represented as agreeable to some such arrangement, but is finding considerable difficulty in handling his own conservative elements. In a reported interview he is alleged to have said regarding the war rumors that mountains were being made out of molehills and that he was firmly convinced that Queen Victoria would never allow "letting loose the dogs of war" over South Africa.

LONDON, June 26.—The Government of the South African republic, according to a despatch to the Daily Mail from Rome, is ordering large quantities of rifles from Italian firms for immediate shipment.

Canada Steel Company.

MONTREAL, June 25.—The promoters of the Canada Steel Company have decided to issue \$8,000,000 in thirty years gold bonds bearing five per cent. Of these bonds \$2,000,000 will be retained in the treasury. The common stock will amount to \$15,000,000 and it will be allotted at a meeting of the board of directors to be held in Boston in a short time. The promoters have subscribed for a very large proportion of it. Canadians are to take at least \$5,000,000. The full board of directors, it is announced, consists of H. M. Whitney, H. F. Dimock and Almerie H. Paget, of Boston, Sir W. C. Van Horne, R. B. Angus, James Ross and Robert McKay of Montreal, Hon. Geo. Cox and Elias Rogers of Toronto, and Hon. D. McKean, Michael Dwyer, B. F. Pearson and W. B. Ross of Halifax. Contracts for the furnaces, etc., have been awarded to the River Connolly Company of Pittsburg, the amount involved being in the neighborhood of \$2,500,000. The contract is to be completed within seventeen months. The contract for the steel mill has not yet been awarded.

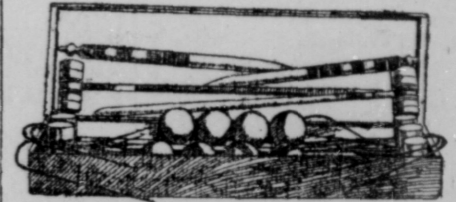
