# QUE. MP HAS FLAG PLEDGE

**OTTAWA (CP)**—A Liberal MP has composed a pledge to the Canadian flag which he would like adopted for use in schools across the country.

Alexandre Cyr, 42, who represents the riding of Gaspé in the Commons, said in an interview Canadian children should be taught to love and respect their flag. Daily recitation of a pledge—like the one used in U.S. schools—might be the answer.

Mr. Cyr's pledge reads: "To my flag and to the country it represents, I pledge respect and loyalty."

"Wave with pride from sea to sea and within your folds keep us ever united."

"Be for all a symbol of freedom and justice. God keep our flag. God protect our Canada."

The last two sentences of the pledge were used by Prime Minister Pearson in his address on Parliament Hill when the new maple leaf flag was flown for the first time.

Mr. Cyr said the need for such a pledge first occurred to him while he was involved in scout work in Gaspé.

He had intended to introduce a private bill in the Commons asking that his pledge be adopted. But because it involves education, he's been told it's a matter for the provinces to decide.

Mr. Cyr said he is sending copies of his pledge to all members of the 10 provincial legislatures, asking their support.

# Outlook Better For Labor Gov't

**LONDON (Reuters)**—The Labor government completed its first six months in office Friday, confident of "riding high" despite a number of setbacks, but with the toughest battles still ahead.

Prime Minister Wilson returned from the United States Friday confident his party would win a bigger mandate if a general election was held now.

But there were no signs that Wilson, now governing with a basic parliamentary margin of only three, is thinking of a new national contest.

But it was equally clear that his administration is at present in a far stronger position than seemed likely only a few weeks ago.

This is more a reflection of the 49-year-old prime minister's own personal success in establishing himself as a national and world leader than through any spectacular policies his government has pursued.

**TWO TRENDS APPARENT**

But it also comes about from two other important trends that have become increasingly evident since October's general election.

First of these is a continuing decline in relative electoral support for Sir Alec Douglas-Home's Conservative opposition party, underlined by its recent upset by-election defeat at Roxburgh, Scotland, at the hands of the minority Liberal party.

The second factor is an apparent willingness by the voters to accept from the new government unpopular measures, including a total of £600,000,000 (\$1,800,000,000) new taxes that would have caused an outcry if imposed by the previous conservative administration.

With the electorate in this mood, many veteran politicians believe Wilson is biding before thinking seriously about a new election—possibly until the spring of next year.

# UC Clergyman Plans To Study Church And War

**TORONTO (CP)**—The former moderator of the United Church of Canada general assembly Very Rev. James Ralph Mutchmor, says he plans to spend the next few years studying relationship between war and the church's attitude to it.

Dr. Mutchmor held a reception here as his memories entitled Mutchmor, rolled of the press.

Now approaching 73, Dr. Mutchmor chuckled at a suggestion by Rev. Earl Kulbeck, public relations officer for the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, that he try to get a seat in the Senate as an independent.

Dr. Mutchmor said he believes United Church congregations tend to be "too middle-class and too respectable" and don't cry out "hallelujah" often enough during worship services.

# CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

This hand appears in Play Bridge with Reese and is chiefly notable because it contains a highly unusual play.

Let's say you're declarer at Six Spades and that West leads the three of spades. When you play the seven from dummy, East follows with the two. The problem is how to play the hand so as to give yourself the best chance of making the contract.

Of course you don't see the opponents' cards, but even so, the best line of play can be figured out.

There are two methods of play that stand out. One is to take a diamond finesse at once. If it succeeds, the contract is made by then ruffing a diamond or two in dummy.

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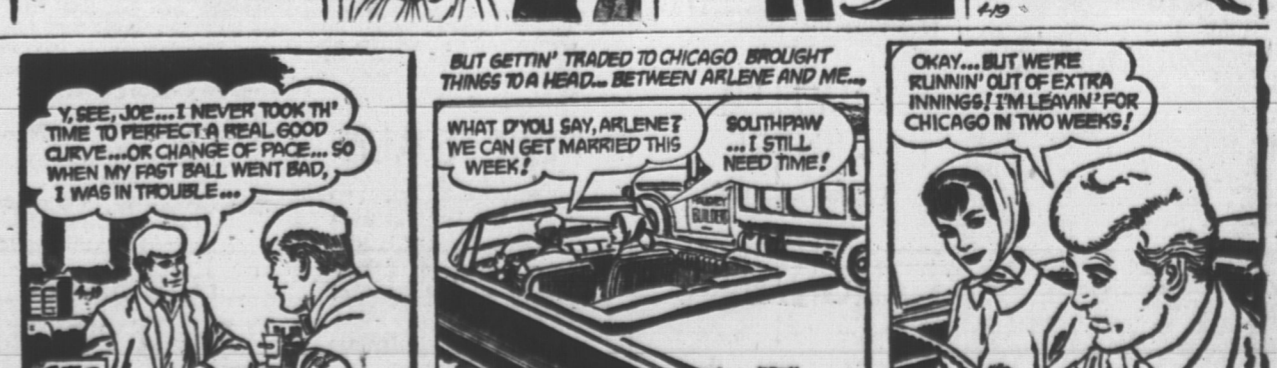
