DO EUROPE ON A BIKE.

POPULARITY OF A WHEELING TRIP THROUGH FOREIGN LANDS. Very Cheap and Very Entertaining—In Fact, Some Who Have Tried It Say It is Cheaper Than Having at Home—Some Figures.

About this time it's getting to be quite the fad to make economical trips to Europe. If one has a bicycle, so much the better. Wheeling about, pedestrianism all hollow in both comfort and rapidity, and for the student bicyclist is better than railroad-travel, for by the former method of travel out of the way places may be penetrated and the beaten path can be monopolized by the plutocrat and the occasional vacationist who do not care to economize when details of a journey are concerned. However, present European trips may be to persons in certain financial circumstances, to the average Canadian they are extremely unusual, and when one is taken it marks an epoch in the life of the individual. It is interesting to know that a New York bicyclist traveled in this manner through England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland, was gone twelve and a half weeks and the journey cost him \$95. This demonstrates that such trips are not so expensive as they are reported to be.

As a matter of fact this example has been contagious and a party of seventeen calling themselves the Anarchist Wheeling Club have started on their journey to do Holland on a wheel. The Holland trip is preferred, apparently, for the reason that it is a country not much traveled by Canadians and the fare is cheap. Besides, the roads are reported good. "Talk about pleasant trips!" said an enthusiast who has done some bicycling about Europe, "it is cheaper to go to Europe than it is to stay here during the summer. Think of it—ninety-eight dollars for a first class round trip steamer ticket. Then when you get to Holland you merely break away in any direction, for you are sure to find good roads wherever you may go. The country is thoroughly built up. You can get into an fifty cents a day you can live like a prince. Of course, you can use more money if you throw it at birds and want to buy the house at which you may be stopping, but fifty cents a day will see you through very comfortably in the country. Five cents, for instance, in the realm will get a splendid breakfast, consisting of hard-boiled eggs, a hot omelette, some bacon and a cup of steaming coffee. For a drink of 'schnappé' you will have to pay a few cents extra, of course.

"And the service is excellent. A boxcar Dutch girl with a broad grin on her ruddy face brings you the food, asks you if you want more and you assure Dutch is as well as clearly like German to make 'Yah' intelligible, and you say 'Yah.' All the members of the family come in to admire you and your bicycle, and when you lie down, you undoubtedly leave an ineffaceable impression on the waiter's mind. You see, the frugality, the good ter... or two, feeling exhibited by these... the kindly... the excellent... their estimation... their descendants in... them highly you may rather... them before.

rather bad habit I have found slightly developed in the parts of Holland, when the beds are clean, and lodging on the road will be found very pleasant. The last trip I took was with a party of seven persons. Each man had his tent, the only unpleasant feature was an economical friend. The economical man would ask for three raw eggs, which he wanted to boil over his oil stove. None of us knew the language, and the oil stove fellow would have an awful time making himself clear. Notice to Commercial Travellers.

The attention of Commercial Travellers is called to the following provisions of an Act passed by the Legislative Assembly of Prince Edward Island, Session 1894, entitled "An Act to Impose a Direct Tax on Certain Classes of Travellers." From and after the passing of this Act every casual trader not permanently residing in the Province, commonly known as "Commercial Travellers," and every person not permanently residing in this Province, who either in person or by agent, solicitor or canvasser for orders either in person or by agent, solicitor or canvasser, or by word of mouth without the production of samples, photographs, catalogues, printed or written matter, shall, before he or she enters upon the business of so selling any goods, wares or merchandise, or soliciting orders, or canvassing for such orders, pay to the Provincial Treasurer of this Province an annual license fee or direct tax of fifteen dollars. License shall grant authority authorizing the person therein named to sell goods, wares and merchandise in this Province, and to solicit orders for such goods, wares and merchandise, and to canvass for such orders, pay to the Provincial Treasurer of this Province an annual license fee or direct tax of fifteen dollars.
