City Council Controversy Over Tenders Last Night

Charlottetown's City Council approved a number of tenders at a special session late yesterday afternoon which viewed the business of tender letting on a "share the wealth" basis at times instead of always accepting the lowest tender.

The "share the wealth" terminology was used first by Deputy Mayor A. Walther Gaudet when the Council was discussing the awarding of a contract for certain changes and renovation to City Hall itself.

The resolution proposed that "the tender of Chandler Brothers for the renovation of the City Tax Office and City Clerk's office as per plans and specifications prepared by Mr. J. F. Toombs be accepted at a price of \$4475.

The controversy developed when it was learned that another firm, County Construction Ltd., had submitted a slightly lower tender at \$4447.

The recommendation of the tender committee to award the contract to Chandler Brothers, it was explained, was based on the fact that they were a completely local firm and that they were specialists in this type of work whereas the other firm were general contractors.

Councillor Gormley questioned the principle of awarding the contract to the "highest tender". Councillor Gaudet retorted that it was not the highest tender. Another firm had put in a tender at three thousand dollars higher and they were not considered. A general discussion involved all the councillors, and the Mayor who pointed out that it was traditional to accept the lowest tender.

The County Construction firm itself got into the controversy when Norman Stewart, a member of the firm, spoke for several minutes stating why he thought his firm was just as well qualified to do the job and he contended that it was also a "local" organization and was entitled to equal consideration.

Councillor Gaudet stated that the County Construction firm had

already had several contracts from the City this year and are now working on the large contract building the new high school.

Finally a standing vote gave the contract to Chandler Brothers by a vote of six to two. Councillor Gormley and Councillor P. R. McCormac voted against it.

It seemed to be a controversial evening so far as contract awarding was concerned. The same thing cropped up, again when a resolution was introduced to award a contract to British American Oil Company for supplying the City with furnace fuel oil. The B.A. tender was at 17.55 cents a gallon. Identical bids from Irving Oil and Imperial Oil at 17.80 cents a gallon were also submitted.

It was stated among other things that "B.A." had had the City furnace fuel oil business now for the past three years and it was time to give someone else a chance on a "share the wealth" basis. It was also stated that British American pays some \$16.50 in taxes to the City whereas Irving Oil pays \$11.50-75 annually and Imperial pays \$14,054.25.

Finally the resolution was lost and it was decided to offer the contract to Irving and Imperial on a joint basis, if that is acceptable to them.

OTHER BUSINESS

The tender of Lounsbury Limited was accepted for supplying a payload at a price of \$14,967.

The tender of Pickard Machinery, Charlottetown to supply a Picard Junior Snowblower at \$16,156 F.O.B. Montreal was accepted. It was explained that a tender of \$7,700 was received from the Cocksbut Machinery Company but it specified a tractor with a snowblower attached in front. This was not the kind of equipment desired, it was explained.

It was stated that the purchase of the snowblower with a plow attachment, will give the

City three plows and a snowblower and it is anticipated that they will be able to do an efficient job of clearing the streets this coming winter.

Councillor Gormley, recalling that last year clearing of snow from streets was abandoned, asked if it was intended to do more work this year and asked for a statement on policy in this regard. The reply indicated that the street committee would come up with a policy later and submit it to the Council for approval.

The Council also authorized the City Clerk to purchase from Parker and Son, Georgetown, a number of catch-basin covers and rings.

Expressing the views of all three visiting executives, Mr. Lasby said, "We are happy to again enjoy the hospitality of P.E.I. and also the very excellent weather that has prevailed thus far during our visit."

Asian Flu Cases Reported Officially In Five Provinces

OTTAWA (CP) — Spot checks have turned up a handful of proven cases of Asian flu in five provinces and Health Minister J. Waldo Monteith says it is "more than likely" that the same new strain of the flu virus will be identified in other outbreaks of illness across the country.

A statement Friday by Mr. Monteith said the Asian strain has been identified in British Columbia, Alberta, Ontario and Quebec. And in Manitoba, a provincial official said two cases, have been confirmed as Asian flu.

Mr. Monteith and other officials said the ailment is a mild one. The minister's statement said the vaccine to protect key personnel against the flu is ready for shipment.

ARMED FORCES FIRST

The armed forces will get the first batch of 15,000 doses and next month supplies will go to the provincial health departments and parishes which will handle distribution.

Some 600,000 doses are expected to be available by the end of the year with an additional supply of more than 600,000 to be ready during the first three months of next year.

The reports of Asian flu give an incomplete picture of the likely spread and extent of the disease, officials say. Complicated laboratory tests, which take a week or more and are essential in

determining existence of the specific ailment, could be made in only a handful of cases.

These are the identified Asian flu cases in the five provinces: Ontario—Two in Sudbury and six at Doe Lake at an international girl guide camp near Huntsville.

Quebec—At least 11 persons, recent incoming passengers on two ocean liners from overseas.

Manitoba—Two boy scouts from Morden and Flin Flon, ill on arrival home from the boy scout world jamboree in England.

Alberta—Four cases, all now recovered.

British Columbia—An undetermined number of proven cases. B.C. deputy health minister G. F. Amyot said several specimens were sent to Ottawa where the disease was confirmed, but a detailed report has not yet been received at Victoria.

Meanwhile, press reports from across the country have told of schools in scattered communities being closed, and many hundreds of persons made ill by influenza.

Officials here indicate that, to date, there can be only conjecture on how much of the flu is of the Asian variety.

At any rate, the present influenza outbreaks appear to be more widespread than in previous fall seasons—the usual time for flu to increase.

ILLNESS MILD

The statement of Health Minister Monteith here said the illness is mild. Symptoms of fever, headache, sore throat, coughing and

Deaths from Asian flu were "quite rare"—experience abroad was about one in every 5,000 cases.

The disturbing feature, he said, is its tendency to spread rapidly through a community. Thus the vaccine program had been started to help keep essential services going—hospitals and other health services, food supplies, transportation and the like.

Mr. Monteith cautioned that the vaccine's effectiveness is not fully established, but added: "It is expected to confer a substantial degree of protection against Asian influenza."
