Highland Chief Will Open Games

The Highland games to be held this year at Eldon on August 5 will be officially opened by Lord Alexander Macdonald, chief of Clan Donald. The 22nd chief-tain of this ancient Scottish clan, Lord Macdonald succeeded to the title in May 1947.

With a titular claim dating from the great seal charter of February 13, 1727, the head of Clan Donald is recognized as the chief of all the Macdonalds, and his visit to Prince Edward Island will be hailed by all descendants of the clan and Scotsmen generally.

It is believed that in the Maritimes the Macdonalds outnumber the descendants of any other clan.

Lord Macdonald's seat is at Armadale Castle on the Isle of Skye. His full title is Right Honourable Alexander Godfrey Macdonald of Macdonald, Baron of the Barony of Macdonald in the Isle of Skye. Representative of the family of Macdonald of Macdonald, chief of the Name and Arms of Macdonald.

SUMMERSIDE—Although the price of haircuts has recently been raised to one dollar, three of the seven barber shops located in the Summerside business district yesterday were still doing business at the 75-cent rate, and planning to leave prices unchanged.

All of the shops seemed to be fairly busy with customers who obviously were visiting tourists forming most of the trade.

A spokesman for the Barbers' Association said his group had raised the price to one dollar to be in line with a recent price increase in Charlottetown, and other Maritime centers.

One of the barbers whose shop is continuing to charge the 75-cent rate expressed the view that it was unlikely that any of his prices would be raised.

The raise announced by the Barbers' Association included a hike in the price of children's haircuts to a new charge of seventy-five cents.

Premiers And APEC Will Confer In N.B.

The 1959 Atlantic Conference of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council will be held at the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, Monday and Tuesday, September 14-15. It was announced today by APEC President Dr. Frank MacKinnon. Concurrently, the next meeting of the Conference of Atlantic Premiers will be held in the New Brunswick capital on Tuesday, as previously announced by New Brunswick Premier Hugh John Fleming.

Meetings of both the Premiers' Conference and APEC will be coordinated in various ways, it was learned, including a joint dinner on Tuesday sponsored by the Province of New Brunswick.

The four premiers and their parties and APEC members attending the conference are being invited by Lord Beaverbrook, to attend the opening of his new Art Gallery in Fredericton the following Wednesday, it was learned.

toward paying the school teachers salaries.

Councillor MacCaull pointed out that this year's educational costs are estimated at \$151,802.50 against last year's actual costs of \$78,616.76 but that this year a part of the school debentures are charged to the school as it should be. He pointed out that there has been an increase in the estimate of the cost of protection to persons and property, adding that much of this is due to the increase in street lighting by virtue of the new rate now in effect.

The estimates of expenditures for the coming year total \$649,141.10. Revenue is estimated at \$272,141.10, leaving a balance required from taxation of \$377,000.00. The assessment roll of thirteen million dollars for the town at a rate of 29 per thousand arrives at this required taxation figure of \$377,000, where at the former rate of 25 per thousand the tax revenue would amount to only \$325,000.

The forecast of capital requirements amount to \$145,234.43 which includes such items as Hillcrest Housing water and sewerage, Hillcrest streets, the paving of Cedar, Hawthorne, Coronation Avenue and Victoria Road. However the reduction in serial debentures for 1959 is \$89,000, the capital grant from the provincial government \$43,450 and \$13,500
