Carloadings OTTAWA, April 20 (CP) - Carloadings on Canadian railways remained steady during the week ended April 14 at 79,737 cars, compared with 79,734 cars for the previous week, but rose sharply over the 69,072 cars for the corresponding week a year ago. The Bureau of Statistics reported today that increases over the similar week last year were shown in loadings of grain products, coal, ores, building materials, pulpwood, lumber, and woodpulp and paper. Decreases were registered in loadings of livestock and gasoline.
