Pius On Hockey Jaunt

AFTER only a short absence we were asked once again to fill in for regular columnist Pius Callaghan so that he could attend a couple of hockey meetings.

Being president of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association may entail many extra hours of work but it also has its good points. Right now I don't think I would mind much if I was sitting in the back seat of the Occocheo bus heading for Toronto on a week-long trip.

Before he left we asked Pius if he would be seeing any NHL games while he was away, and he said he hoped to see Canadiens at home to Toronto Maple Leafs Thursday night and Leafs and Rangers Saturday night at Maple Leaf Gardens. We're not trying to spoil your trip Pius but we hope that the Blackmen are winners Thursday night.

Pius is first attending the annual meeting of the Maritime body in Moncton and from there travels to Toronto for a CAHA meet.

The second annual Morell Sports Dinner is being held tonight and the committee that arranged this annual affair made a good choice of who they asked Gus MacFarlane, football and basketball coach of Mount Allison University, to be guest speaker. Although we've never heard Gus in an after dinner speaking role we've chatted with him several times and we're positive he would be an articulate and witty fellow on the mashed potato circuit.

A Chat With Gus

WE HAD a chance to speak to the Mount A coach last Saturday between halves of the SDU-Mount A basketball game at St. Dunstan's, which incidentally the Saints won by a 72-63 score. At the time the Mountaineers trail by a 26-12 score and although his aids were behind Gus appeared quite happy.

"It was amazed by the improvement of this team since the start of the season," said Gus. "Eight of the players are first year men, two are second year, and only one third year."

"You take this boy Harrison" (tallest player on the team) "6 foot 7" he continued, "he comes from Bermuda and is a soccer player. He had never played basketball before he came to the university and he's been working for it ever since."

"WE PLAYED four games at the start of the season and it must have been a shocker to the boys," he said. "The first game and home games with four U.S. colleges. The first game of the season against an American college we lost by a score of 112-58, then two other colleges from across the border and we lost by 43 and we lost all of our games." He added, "then they played St. F.X. and lost by only 17 points and in the first meeting with Saint Dunstan's we won by four points and we are improving."

Coach MacFarlane thinks his players gain much experience by competing with college teams.

"We asked Gus if he had many U.S. players on his team and his answer was: "None. As far as I know we have no American players on any of our basketball teams." This is surprising when you stop and take a look at other universities in the Maritimes. Practically all the basketball teams have a sprinkling of players from the States.

Gus then switched his talk to his 1963 football team. "Would you like to see it?" he asked. "I'll show it to you. It's a seven Martimians and three on defence. This, of course, includes Ricky Black of Halifax, the most valuable player in the 'A' section of the Atlantic Conference this year."

Junior Penguins Trounce Combines 0-4 At Arena

Old Spain Junior Penguins, founded by the high schooling line of Stan Peardon, Dave Lawlor and Gord Whitlock, cobblestoned visiting Prince County Combines 0-4 in a regular league tussle at the Sports Arena last night.

This line accounted for eight of the ten Penguin goals. Stan Peardon the small but heavy Montague puckster, topped the trio's output with four goals and, as many assists. Dave Lawlor was only one point back with two goals and five assists and Whitlock triggered two and led on three others. The other two Penguin goals were scored by Willie Gallant and Dave Gaudet.

Gary and his father will be taken to Sweden to see Trail Smoke Eaters as they try to win the world amateur title. The original nine provincial winners were selected by draw from hundreds of entries. An independent panel of four judged essays on Why Hockey is a Good Game for Canadian Boys in considering the final winner.

Andy Bathgate Seeking Pro Golf Job In Toronto

NEW YORK (CP) — Andy Bathgate, New York Rangers winger who recently made headlines by scoring in 10 consecutive games, is seeking summer-time employment in Toronto as a golf professional.

He said Tuesday he hopes to talk with officers of three golf clubs in Toronto when Bathgate visits there to play the Maple Leafs this weekend. His objective is to secure a summer-time job as an assistant pro at Oakdale, Northwood or Baviour.

Eventually, he said, he hopes to make golf his full-time profession — an ambition toward which he has been working for five years.

Bathgate, a native of Winnipeg who has made Vancouver his home in summer during his 10 seasons with New York, will be 31 next Aug. 2.

THINK OF SECURITY

That's an age at which many athletes, and especially those in the rugged, body-contact sports such as pro hockey, begin to think about security.

"There's more security in this than there is in hockey," Bathgate said in an interview at Madison Square Garden.

Bathgate's progress in hockey has been well established. He's scored 20 goals or more in seven of the last eight seasons, reaching a high of 40 in 1959-60, and he's got 23 so far this season, including 11 he scored during his record-setting 10-game streak.

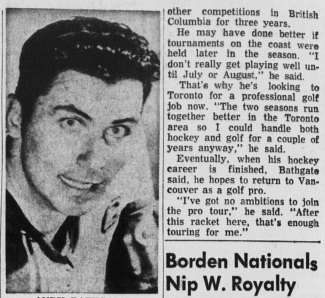

is perhaps less known, but in five years as an amateur he has established himself as above average. He shoots consistently in the 70s and by mid-July last year, after he'd had a couple of months play, he had a scratch handicap. Two years ago he won the Vancouver City amateur and he's showed well in other competitions in British Columbia for three years.

He may have done better if tournaments on the coast were held later in the season. "I don't really get playing well until July or August," he said.

DISCUSS SWAZILAND

LONDON (Reuters)—Duncan Sandys, Commonwealth and colonial secretary, formally opened constitutional talks here Monday which will decide the future political advance of the British territory of Swaziland, an area of 7,000 square miles almost surrounded by the territory of South Africa.
