Many Attend Service Despite Rain At Souris

Remembrance Day was fittingly observed by a large crowd despite the heavy rain at Souris yesterday afternoon, with a stirring ceremony in honour of the fallen comrades in two World Wars at the memorial monument.

The parade of Legion members and the members of the Reserve Army was marshalled by Lieutenant Foch MacDonald, and arrived at the monument at 3.40. On arrival of the parade, the president of the Souris branch, Canadian Legion, Comrade Dan MacPhee called for two minutes silence which followed the laying of wreaths by the following: Souris Branch, Canadian Legion, Comrade Dan MacPhee; Town of Souris, His Worship, Mayor C. F. Lavie; the general public.

Rev. Monsignor Murphy and Rev. W. D. Corkum spoke on the theme of the sacrifice made by the veterans in preserving peace and liberty, and how it was again being threatened by other powers at this particular time. The ceremony concluded with "The King".

The evening will be held this evening at the Legion Home for all veterans.

Record Attendance At Georgetown Memorial Service

The largest attendance on record observed Remembrance Day services at Georgetown yesterday afternoon with a most impressive ceremony held at the war memorial.

The two Legion branches of Georgetown and Cardigan joined with the citizens of the two districts in paying tribute to those heroes who paid the supreme sacrifice in the cause of liberty.

The parade, about two blocks long, marshalled by Comrade L. S. Bachelder, formed at the Town Hall at 2.00 p. m., and proceeded to the memorial monument. In order were the Marshal, Standard Bearer, Com. Michael Burke, Jr., the veterans of the two world wars from Georgetown, Cardigan, and the surrounding area, headed by the presidents of the Georgetown and Cardigan branches.

Ladies Auxiliary of the Georgetown branch of the Canadian Legion, Boy Scouts and Cubs under the leadership of S.M. D.A. McCormac, Government representatives, Mayor and Councillors, clergy, school children and citizens.

At the war memorial the following program was followed: O Canada, by the school children; two minutes' silence; stanza of poem "For The Fallen" read by J. H. MacDonald; roll call of Georgetown men who died serving in His Majesty's forces by J. H. MacDonald; roll call of Cardigan men who died serving in His Majesty's forces by Joseph McAulay; prayer by Rev. W. A. Patterson; laying of wreaths in the following order: Next of kin of departed veterans; Georgetown branch Canadian Legion, president W. A. Patterson; Cardigan branch Canadian Legion, past president, William Brothers; Ladies Auxiliary, Georgetown branch president, Mrs. J. W. Lavers; Provincial Government, Hon. Keir Clark, M.L.A.; Town of Georgetown, His Worship, Mayor P. L. Boudreau; Holy Name Society, St. James Church, Com. Frank Lavander; Women's Association of St. David's United Church, Mrs. A. H. Stewart; general public.

Particular notice was taken of two Scout Patrol leaders in uniform, Donald MacDonald and Jackie Lavers, who stood on either side of the war memorial with staff in guard position, and bowed in reverent remembrance of the fallen heroes.

After the ceremony was concluded, the parade returned to the Town Hall where Legion president, Rev. W. A. Patterson, and vice president, J. B. Scully, were joint chairmen over the remaining program.

The hymn "O God, Our Help In Ages Past" was sung. Remarks were given by president W. A. Patterson, Rev. O. Kiggins, Major John A. MacDonald, M.L.A., Hon. Keir Clark, M.L.A., Joseph Campbell, Poplar Point, James H. Skinner, Bridgetown, Mr. A. H. Stewart, Georgetown, and Legion vice president, J. B. Scully. The program closed with the National Anthem.

The veterans and their guests then retired to the Legion Hall.

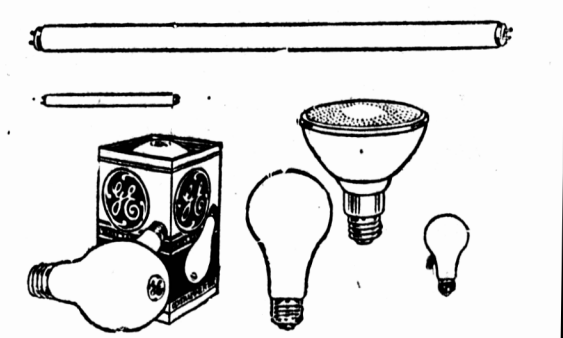
