The Canada Pacific Railway car shops at Perth, Ontario, have been completed. The number of hands employed in the shops is about 250.

Fifty men and boys are employed at the Colbrook rolling mills. This is one of the places the Grays used to intimate had been closed by the tariff.

A WHOLE FAMILY were seriously poisoned at Liverpool N. S., on Saturday last, by eating cultivated strawberries that had been grown near some currant bushes on which hellebore had been sprinkled. Their illness continued for two days.

MR. WM. COMPTON, one of the Dominion Arbitrators, has been in the city the past day or two investigating some Railway claims. He leaves to-morrow morning for Summerside and thence to Moncton. We understand that Mr. Compton proceeds to Winnipeg in a few days.

No matter how many Chinamen gather into a den here is always room for a few more. When the last cargo of 750 arrived at Victoria every Chinese house in the place was more than full and yet every one of the 750 were accommodated with sleeping room by their countrymen.

MR. GLADSTONE has written a letter to Mr. Lyon Playfair commending in the highest terms the latter's conduct in the chair during the trying period when the Chinese bill was in committee.

WHAT odd names some unfortunate are doomed to go through life with! We have just read of an English farmer who committed suicide by throwing himself down the shaft of a coal pit. No cause is alleged, but the man's name was Archimedes Muff. A trans-Atlantic contemporary suggests that his name should have been de congruo, Empedocles, as that philosophic poet sought rest and immortality by throwing himself into the burning bosom of Mount Etna. It is not likely, however, Archimedes Muff was aware that his act of frenzy had so illustrious a precedent or that his great namesake met the King of Terrors in the form of a blood-thirsty and lo-t-seeking soldier. Had he known, indeed, that so distinguished an inventor had borne the name which had found such strange company in his own patronymic, he might have been reconciled to the burden. He was an elderly man and must, therefore, have had no common share of fortitude. But his name proved too much for him at last and in desperation he sought oblivion of it in the world. Yet Archimedes Muff might have been still worse off than he was. We have heard of a minister of a certain church, an estimable man, not unknown in the Dominion, whose name was so awkward that his friends usually spoke of him in parliamentary fashion. Some years ago, in the ecclesiastical intelligence of the Times we saw that the Rev. T. Leaves had been thought worthy of promotion, and only the other day we noticed among the arrivals at New York, that of Mr. Galusha A. Grow and Judge Pacificus Ord. If anyone took the trouble of reading the list of names which appear from time to time in the papers, he would soon form a collection in which Charles Dickens would have delighted. All his names were real and generally taken from Government reports.

CONVERSAZIONE.—It is proposed to hold a Conversazione and Flower Festival, on Thursday, the 3rd of August, in the Drill Shed, to promote the establishing of a Reformatory and Industrial School. On that occasion it is intended to form a Committee of gentlemen to devise the best means for providing a suitable building for the institution; and who will at a later day wait upon the Government with a view to securing an annual grant for its maintenance. To better promote the formation of such a committee, Colonel Gray, as Chairman of the preliminary meeting, advised that the ladies of the committee should specially invite the Clergy, the members of the Bench and the Bar, and also His Worship the Mayor, to countenance, by their presence on that occasion, the work in hand.
