

trees, young and old, and carrying away flying signs, awnings, and even the iron awning posts, which were snapped like reeds, in Broadway and other streets, exposed to the fury of the tempest. Washington Parade Ground presented, yesterday morning, a scene of desolation, most of the trees being prostrated. Tompkins Square and the other Parks suffered equally. A number of chimney tops were carried off. The city generally exhibited all the appearance of the ravages of "an angel of death on the blast."

The shipping was considerably damaged at the wharves in the East River, and in the North River several dragged their anchors. The whistling of the wind through the cordage was fearful. Many vessels, as will be seen, were driven ashore. Accounts of serious disasters at sea are expected. It was indeed, a rough night.

LATER FROM CALIFORNIA.

The U. S. Mail Steamship Crescent City, Capt. Brown, has arrived from Chagres, (via) Kingston, Ja. with 157 passengers. The Crescent City brings \$180,000 in gold dust, in the hands of passengers.

A destructive fire occurred at San Francisco on the 14th of June. Over 300 buildings destroyed. Loss estimated at \$4,000,000.

Much embarrassment to business men will be the necessary consequence, and great loss probably to shippers and merchants in the Northern cities of the United States.

The news from the mining districts continues to be unfavourable, owing to the high state of the water in the creeks and rivers.
