Tampering With Trolley Circuits.

It is asserted that the stealing of current on trolley circuits for use in houses, saloons and stores is becoming very common. This is a surprising view of the ease with which the tapping of the circuit can be effected. A simple test for determining the source of any suspected electric lighting was put in practice lately with conclusive results. A station superintendent, in passing a saloon, noticed electric lights go out, and then start up bright again, as the incandescent lights in the trolley cars sometimes do. He thought that was a queer way for the lights supplied by his station to behave, and he decided to investigate. Being familiar with the technical difference between the current system for lighting and the method of supplying electric power for the propulsion and illumination of cars, he knew that by a very simple experiment he could find out something more as to the source of the supply of the current. A lighting company wires a building so that the incandescent lamp in it can be shut off or taken out without affecting the others. In a railway plant the lamps are fed in such a way that if one is shut off all ceases to glow. The superintendent passed into a side room of the saloon, and quietly unscrewed one of the incandescent lamps. As he expected, all the lights on the same wire went out. On the following night the current supplying the electric line on that street was, by agreement, cut off at a certain time. At that moment the illumination in the saloon ceased. When the current was turned on again the saloon was again lighted up. Examination showed that the wire had been tapped near the saloon, the connection with the feed wire being made by means of a nail. A large number of similar "taps" were found. In some cases the job had been done by a bogus "station man" who had called regularly for payment of the current supposed to have been consumed. This, at all events, was the story told by some of the men who were found using the stolen current.

A House of Myself.

One of these days people will move their houses instead of their household goods, if an English inventor's plan succeeds. H. J. Lawson, of London, is going to build a two-story house to run on wheels and be propelled by a motor underneath. The house will contain four rooms, and its framework is to be of steel tubing. The upper story's construction will be of such a nature that it can be raised up and thus be made capable of passing under a bridge across a cut in a road. All sorts of conveniences are planned for this house on wheels. It will have a bath room and all the appurtenances thereto. The kitchen will contain a range and a good-sized refrigerator for fuel. There shall be a refrigerator and ample storage space for edibles. Mr. Lawson is the man who sixteen years ago tried so earnestly to make motor cars popular in England, but without avail. This latest idea of his is on the same principle of propulsion as the motor cars, and Mr. Lawson holds that it is as practical to make a "station man" travel about on wheels as it is a wagon. The house on wheels is already a fact in the United States, although horses form the motor power. One family has been traveling about the Western States all summer in this manner.

TOBACCO IN WILLS.

Curious Directions Left by the King of Smokers.
Klags, the merchant of Rotterdam, was called the king of smokers, from his devotion to the gentle weed, and he had a right regal funeral. By the terms of his will, every smoker who was present at it was presented with ten pipes and two Dutch pipes, on which were engraved the name, arms and date of the decease of the testator. All his guests were invited to be careful to keep their pipes alight during the funeral ceremonies, and to empty their ashes into his grave. His will was lined with the cedar of his old Havana cigar boxes, and a packet of old Dutch tobacco was placed at the foot of his coffin. His favorite pipe was laid by his side along with a box of matches, as well as five and steel and some tinder, as he had expressed an opinion that "there was no knowing what might happen." Some anti-tobaccoists of the period seem to have wickedly remarked that these precautions about procuring a light would be found superfluous. The courts recently set aside a clause in the will of an anti-tobacco leaguer in Ireland. This gentleman had a prejudice against smoking, perhaps because it made him sick, and inserted this paragraph in his last testament: "I have told my sons, John, Richard and Samuel, that if they indulge in the habit they would forfeit \$50 each, to be divided among their sisters, and should they at any time begin this habit, their sisters may sue them each for £500."

Tree Split a Bowlder.

The wonderful force of the roots of growing trees is demonstrated on a hill in Mill Valley, where a laurel has split a huge bowlder into three pieces. The trees of the type common in many parts of California, but there are several queer things about it and its surroundings, says the San Francisco Call. The place where the tree grows is a most unusual one for its species, which naturally requires considerable moisture. The fact of the tree taking root in a barren rock is also unusual in California on account of the long, dry summers, during which the rock is usually so hot that it is not possible to grow anything unless there is considerable moisture in the soil. The exact location of this botanical curiosity is a few hundred feet east of the trail to the top of Tamalpais. The general appearance of the tree is most unusual, and undoubtedly it is very old. At first glance it looks like an oak, but a most unusual one. The upper branches are twisted and turned in all directions, and a large portion of them are dead. In reality the tree looks like those in the Dore illustrations of Dante's Inferno. An examination of the tree and its surroundings shows that the bowlder is one of the largest stones in the vicinity, and cannot weigh less than 500 tons. The location of the tree is almost exactly in the middle of the stone, and about five feet from the end of the split. This rift in the rock is about 10 feet long, and at one end is only a few inches wide. At the end where the tree is it is at least three feet. To prove that it was the tree that caused the split there is a crack in one of the halves of the bowlder, showing that the growth of the tree was so much that it cracked the rock where it could not move it.

It Was True.

There was a dead silence for a moment, and then one of the others suggested that the little man was laying it on a little thick.
"But it is susceptible of proof gentlemen," persisted the little man. "Standing room only every day in the year, regardless of the attractions that may be playing against you?" said the other slowly. "I'd like to know what company you are with."

Hygienic Hints.

There is probably nothing about which all medical men are more agreed than that the use of tea as a substitute for food is playing havoc with the general health. The most nauseous phlegm may be given to children without trouble by previously letting them suck a peppermint lozenge, a piece of gum or a bit of orange peel. Statistics show that the longest-lived people have generally been those who made breakfast the principal meal of the day. For beef tea cut two pounds of beef into slices, and put in a jar with two pints and a half of water and a pinch of salt. Cover it over. Set it in a warm oven for three or four hours. When done strain through a sieve and set in a cool place, warming a small quantity when required.
