New Montague Bridge In Planning Stage

A new bridge to replace the existing load-limited and narrow bridge at Montague is in the planning stage, and is being designed in accordance with Canadian Engineering Standards specifications by C. A. McVeey, Bridge Consultant with the Department of Public Works and Highways.

The proposed structure will consist of two spans of 80 feet and two of 30 feet, resting on concrete piers with pile foundations, and will be built on a grade of 2 1/2 per cent, starting at the south end, thus reducing the steepness of the approach at the north end, which in conjunction with the old bridge has been a hazard. With five foot sidewalks on each side and a clear roadway of 26 feet, the bridge will carry a maximum load of thirty six tons. The present bridge has a roadway of 15.9 feet and a limit of five tons.

The plans call for two lights at each end and two in the middle, and the bridge will rest on three piers and two abutments of reinforced concrete. Low water mark at the site is nine feet with a rise of about eight feet.

Mr. McVeey was engaged as Bridge Consultant by the Department of Public Works and Highways in this province upon his retirement last February from the New Brunswick department after 51 years service, 26 of which were as Chief Bridge Engineer. He was awarded the M. B. E. in 1943, and last year received an honorary degree of I.L.D. for his contribution to engineering in his native province, from the University of New
