Dr. MacKinnon's Talk

In the field of government, Dr. MacKinnon pointed out, "the positions of King, Governor General and Lieutenant Governor provide the colour and show which human beings seem to like in most of their activities. They help rouse emotions of respect and loyalty which are an essential part of public affairs."

Division of Functions

"This division of functions, one of the most successful inventions of the British constitutional system to the science of government, is a direct concession to the psychological peculiarities of those who govern and those who are governed."
