

Chicago Cubs Nip Braves; Orioles Scalp Indians

CHICAGO (AP) — Byron Browne's bases-loaded single with two out in the 12th gave Chicago Cubs a 6-5 victory over Atlanta Braves Tuesday.

It was the last-place Cubs' seventh victory in 11 games against Atlanta this season. Adolfo Phillips led off the 12th with a single and Glenn Beckers sacrificed. Billy Williams was intentionally walked and after Ted Abernathy struck out Ron Santo the runners moved up on a wild pitch. Ernie Banks then drew an other intentional walk before Browne broke the deadlock.

The Cubs had tied the score 5-5 in the sixth when Hank Aaron lost Browne's fly in the sun for a triple and Don Kessinger singled. Aaron led the Braves' attack, driving in four runs, two with bases-loaded single in the third, another with a home run in the fifth and the fourth by walking with the bases filled in the sixth. Aaron leads the National League in homers with 31 and runs batted in with 84.

(CLEVELAND AP) — Dave Johnson drove in four runs with a homer and a sacrifice fly and Boggs Powell hit a three-run double powering Baltimore Orioles to an 8-6 victory over Cleveland Indians Tuesday night.

Johnson's sixth homer after Brooks Robinson doubled and Sam Brown's single broke a 5-5 tie in the seventh. The Orioles jumped on Cleveland starter Sam McDowell for five runs in the third inning. Powell's key double came after the Orioles loaded the bases.

The Indians came back with two runs on four hits off Dave McNally in the third and added single runs in the fourth, fifth and sixth. Rocky Colavito hit his 24th homer in the ninth, completing the Cleveland score line.

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Bert Campaneris rapped a two-run inside-the-park homer in the sixth and Kansas City Athletics went on to beat Washington Senators 4-3 Tuesday night. The drive was off Bob Humphreys, who relieved starter Frank Kreutzer in the tenth. Willie Kirkland tried to

MINNEAPOLIS AP — Jimmie Hall hit a grand slam homer with two out in the ninth inning, lifting Minnesota Twins to a 7-3 victory over Boston Red Sox Tuesday night.

Hall drove a pitch from Don McMahon 390 feet into the bullpen in right field after McMahon had retired Russ Nixon on a fly ball and struck out Zolo Versalles.

The Twins loaded the bases with none out on a walk to Earl Battey. George Scott's wild throw on Cesar Tovar's bunt and an intentional walk tied the game. All the runs were unearned.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Manny Mota belted a run-scoring double in the eighth Tuesday night, boosting Pittsburgh Pirates to a 6-5 victory over Los Angeles Dodgers. The victory pushed the Pirates to within two percentage

points of the National League-leading Dodgers. Bill Mazeroski led off the Pittsburgh eighth with a single off Ron Perranoski. He was sacrificed to second and after Andre Rodgers walked, Mota delivered his double.

The Dodgers' first four runs came on homers. Lou Johnson's first-inning homer gave the Dodgers a 1-0 lead; Jim Lefebvre's two-run blast in the fourth gave them a 3-1 margin and John Kennedy's bases-empty blow in the fifth tied it.

The Pirates scored three runs in the bottom of the fourth on a double by Willie Stargell. Jose Pagan's run-scoring single lead Donn Clendenon's home run. In the fifth Gene Alley put the Pirates ahead 5-4 with a homer. The Dodgers tied it in the sixth as Johnson singled and scored on Tommy Davis' double.

Ottawa Rough Riders Seen As Top Contenders

OTTAWA (CP) — This time last year coach Frank Clair was predicting an Eastern Football Conference championship for his Ottawa Rough Riders.

For the first half of the season the club looked as if it would live up to its expectations. But a dismal second half left the Riders in their familiar second place and they lost to Hamilton Tiger-Cats in the finals for the third straight year.

The Riders look even better this year with four straight exhibition victories under their belts as they prepare for tonight's EFC opener here against Montreal Alouettes, 1965's third-place team in the East.

But Clair isn't going out on a limb with predictions. "We've improved but so have the other teams," he says cautiously. Clair had 16 rookies last season and their mistakes cost the Riders some key games.

But he still will have rookies in the starting lineup tonight. Roger Perdrix, a 22-year-old, 225-pound University of Cincinnati graduate, and Mike Walderzak, a 23-year-old, 250-pound University of Detroit product, will handle the two offensive guard slots.

Another rookie, Chuck Harrison, 23, of Cornwall, likely will see a lot of action at offensive tackle although he may not yet have earned the first-string berth.

FEW CHANGES
The rest of the team is virtually unchanged. Quarterback Russ Jackson and understudy Bill Cline will direct a back-

field composed of fullback Jim Dillard, halfbacks Bo Scott and Ronnie Steward and flanker Whit Tucker with Rick Black available for fullback or halfback duties should the need arise. Ends Jay Roberts and Ted Watkins also are back for another year.

The Alouettes have both a new look and a new coach this year. Rookie coach Darrell Mudre has rebuilt his interior offensive line and has done much of the job by obtaining veterans. Former Tackle Chet Miksa will centre the line, flanked by guards Kay Vaughan, former Ottawa star trying a comeback, and Tony Pajczkowski, a perennial Western Football Conference all-star from Calgary Stampeders.

At tackle, the Alouettes have Pierre Desjardins and Larry Jordan. Jordan is the only import of the five interior linemen. The Alouettes have a few problems, offensively, including a lack of speed in the backfield. But with veteran Bernie Faloney in the lineup they have no problem at quarterback.

The Riders won a 20-16 victory over the Alouettes in a rain-soaked exhibition game in Montreal last week but failed to make much headway against the Montreal defence. While the Montreal attack looked impressive at times, it bogged down when it had scoring opportunities. Both clubs are expected to rely mainly on a passing game tonight and early forecasts call for almost perfect passing weather—low wind, temperatures in the 60s and partly-cloudy skies but little chance of rain.

Big Early Closer Set For Tonight

A \$2050.00 early closer goes in Summerside tonight. The formation of Summerside's racing card tonight was started away back in February when 78 Maritime bred horses that were winners of \$150 in their lifetime entered in what was to be the largest entry for an early closer in Maritime history on May 15th the sustaining payment saw 26 of them drop out leaving a field of 52 still eligible—and last Saturday, 16 of the 52 declared in to "go", and they will go for a purse of \$2050.00.

The race will be in two divisions with eight horses in each. Four speedsters from the mainland will be here for the big event. Spanish Way with her record of 2:10.2 is likely to be established the favorite in the first division. Two other mares, Fairy Queen from Sackville and Brewer's Best from West Gore, N.S., are also in the first division along with Jim's Way, Rustico Bay, Relosco's Dream, Jolly Don and the trotter Bobby Gallon.

The second division will have the "Truro" entry, Lealand's Bell going away on the rail and Doc Price from the Sobey stable will have to go all out to head this side-wheel owned and driven by Row Wilcox. Also supplying opposition will be Bir Atom, Name The Price, Enterprise Lady, Lou's Lucky Lady and Real Spirit.

One of the supporting classes will have Irene Mir, Glamorous Wick, Sunny Key, Runway, Timmy H. and Port Hill Boy, and in this race it will be a case of "one choice is as good as another" as these six horses are very evenly matched.

The other double dash will see Grattan Abe Gernika, Mountain Marie, Stalag Hanover, and Fastway, all pacers, going against the two trotters Rio Grande and Happy Gallon C.

The single dash which is a exactor, will likely see a record pay—as there will be no favorite in this field of eight pacers: Frankie's Chief has the rail with Caparafay, Silver Glengile, Free Chance, Just Nancy and Mr. Charmer in the first tier, trailed only by Adios Shyster and Shelby Knight.
