REMOVING THE BUILDINGS.—Superintendent Unsworth, Trackmaster Macpherson and Surveyor John Ball, were in Summerside on Monday, when the work of removing the Railway buildings was begun. We learn from the Journal that the freight shed is now being moved. This building is to be moved about seventy-five feet east from its present site, leaving the freight office in nearly the present position, but to the west of the freight shed, which will be close to Water Street, just in front of where the passenger depot now stands. The depot will be placed to the west of the freight office, and adjoining Mr. Jas. Mulhead's property. It will stand several yards back from Water Street, on the present main line. The passage way to the wharf, for teams, will be between the depot and the freight office. It is understood also that arrangements will be made for greater safety than at present for teams at the crossing on Water Street, near Schurman, Clark & Co's mills. The changes being made are all in the interest of shippers and the travelling public.

Bay Chaleur Scandal.
A Fatal Day for the Mercier Government,
Whose Members are all Being Implicated in the Steal.
QUEBEC, Oct. 21.
Yesterday was another fatal day for the Mercier Government, whose members are all being rapidly implicated in the Bay des Chaleurs scandal.
Webb, cashier of the Union Bank, was far more explicit to-day than before the Senate Committee. He stated that Pacaud told him that \$10,000 had to be paid to Attorney-General Langelier; and another \$10,000 or \$20,000 to Hon. Charles Robideaux. The cashier did not remember how much Pacaud had allotted to himself, or whether he was to have only the balance.
It can be imagined the sensation that such reliable testimony would produce, and the faces of Mercier and Pacaud were a study.

The inhabitants have been forced to take refuge in the towers of churches and other elevated places. The damage to property is immense.
