

Abbies Win NB-PEI Title

Tie Campbellton 4-4 Sat. Night At Sports Arena

Charlottetown Juvenile Abbies battled a bigger and more rugged band of Campbellton Tigers to a 4-4 tie at the Sports Arena Saturday night to take the total goal series for the Prince Edward Island-New Brunswick-Juvenile hockey championship 12-8. Abbies took a 4-goal lead into the contest as a result of an 8-4 victory at Campbellton Wednesday.

The Abbies drove in 2 first period goals to up their spread to 6 markers at the end of the first. With Gilles Picard leading the way, the Tigers found their legs in the second and rammed in three unanswered goals with Picard triggering all three. Abbies added two more in the first 14 minutes of the third to put the title out of the reach of the hard-driving Campbellton crew.

Richard Bradley and Mike Cyr were sitting out penalties when Picard caught fire and scored the first of his three goals. Less than a minute later he notched his second taking advantage of a bit of careless play by the Abbies defence and at 13:52 he was back again for his third on a pass from Bill Payne.

Keely kept the Abbies scoreless in the second but the third was a different story. In the early minutes of the period play was continually in Abbie territory as the Tigers put the pressure. But triggering a relay from Brodie Lantz, who got the puck from Arsenalault squeezed the puck between Keely's pad and the goalpost to put the Abbies in front 4-3.

With less than 3 minutes to play big Bill Payne, who shoots with the authority of a lone Tiger, produced the lone Tiger goal in the third period goal on a smacking drive from inside the blue-line. Blatch had his glove on the shot but couldn't hold it.

Young Glennie Thompson blinked the light twice for the Abbies and set up another. Big Don Stewart and linemate Joey Arsenalault got the puck to Thompson in the second period. He followed Picard's three second period goals with a single in the third.

Abbies got the other penalty in the third.

Johnny Blatch held the Abbies together in the first and second periods turning aside some blistering drives from the slap-shot happy Tigers. Blatch turned aside 10 shots in the first, and kicked out a total of 19 over the route. Irving Keely in the opposite end of the rink was equally good and made several stand-out saves.

Stewart and Thompson did the scoring in the opening period. Stewart and linemate Arsenalault and Wayne MacDonald were driving around the Tigers' goal when Arsenalault slipped a short pass to big Don, who eased it into the corner of the net. That goal came at 12:20 and 4 minutes later Glennie Thompson, who played fine hockey for the Abbies all night, slipped in Donnie MacCormick's passout from the corner.
