THE FORCES IN SOUTH AFRICA.

The following figures, based on official and other reliable sources, represent approximately the number of men between the ages of 15 and 60 in South Africa capable of bearing arms:—

Including the Matabele and the natives in the Transvaal there are in round numbers nearly one million men in South Africa capable of bearing arms.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It is said that wireless telegraphy will be used in the event of a Transvaal campaign.

—Sir Wilfrid did believe in the idea that whoever attacks the British lion must reckon with the cubs;—but he has been forced to see it.

—Duncan Bole is now described as "the hero of West Elgin;" but his laurels fade when compared with those won by the "Noble Army of Workers" in North Waterloo.

—Orders have been sent that the Queensland troops for South Africa must be despatched before October 31. This makes it look as if the middle of November would see the British forces in shape for action, and, further, as if action was intended.

—An indication of the war office estimate of the duration of the South African campaign is given by the fact that the authorities have contracted for eight months' supply of bread and other military requisites rendered necessary by the absence of the bulk of the army service corps.

—We are in receipt of another series of Professor Hay's Canadian History readings. This number contains papers by Ganong, Hanney, Raymond and others—the whole forming a valuable and exceedingly interesting contribution to the history of our country. We commend the series of leaflets to students of the history of Canada, Published at St. John, quarterly; price 10 cents, the whole 12 members for one dollar.

—Mr. Tarte, who was interviewed by the Paris Figaro on the Dreyfus affair, was very sad when he spoke of that matter. "I suffer keenly," he said, "from the sufferings of our country—of my country." These last words, observes the Figaro, were uttered in a very low and impressive tone. "For, after all," he continued, "we are French in Canada." What disturbed Mr. Tarte a great deal was the idea that that the press reports on French affairs, as published in Canada, are colored. He suggested the organization of a bureau of information "to influence foreign opinion." The Mail and Empire suggests that Mr. Sifton take over his puffery bureau. What could be more influential than the lying cable despatch which the Ottawa Government sent to England on the subject of the Yukon scandals?

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Montreal Gazette: "West Australia, Victoria, New South Wales, Queensland and New Zealand have offered troops for service in South Africa. None of these colonies have any greater interest in the Transvaal than has Canada. At the jubilee demonstration of 1897 they cut very small figures alongside of the Dominion. In the duty of 1899 Canada is cutting a small figure alongside of them."

The London (England) Mail says:

If the present crisis has its dark, it has also its bright side. It has served to demonstrate once more the passionate loyalty of the colonies to the empire and to the flag. Offers of assistance have poured in from the daughter states which England has founded overseas. The great example set by New South Wales in 1885, when a colonial regiment was despatched to the Sudan, is being followed everywhere. Canada has offered a regiment to be raised and moved at her own cost to the possible seat of war; the Australian commandants are in conclave, and 1,400 Victorians have already volunteered: New Zealand has tendered the help of 200 men. Thus the truth of Sir Alfred Milner's conclusion that the grievances of the Uitlanders concern not England alone, but the whole empire, is being clearly proved. This demonstration of filial love and devotion England can never forget."

This, as the St. John Sun remarks, is all right except the clauses about Canada. The Dominion Premier has been busy at Chicago these few days laying corner stones, holding great Sunday receptions and talking about "the continent to which we belong." But before he went he explained why no regiment was offered. What the Mail says about Victoria, New Zealand and the other colonies is true.

Bay View Briefs and Cavendish Items.

The wharf at Bay View, which was badly torn up by the storm of September 13, is about to be repaired. John C. Clark, Esq., has charge of the work.

Rev G C Robertson, a former popular pastor of the Presbyterian church here, preached to a crowded house in the Cavendish hall on Sunday evening. The sermon, which was an exceedingly able and practical one, was founded on Nathan's words to David, "Thou art the man."

On Monday evening Mr Robertson gave a lecture in the same place: Subject—"The Battle of Life." The lecture was a masterly effort, and more than sustained the Rev gentleman's reputation as a platform speaker. The Rev. Allan Simpson and others highly complimented the lecturer. A hearty vote of thanks was responded to in the Rev gentleman's immediate style.

Church building operations in Cavendish remain in "Statu Quo" for the present.

A "call" has been extended to the Rev. Mr. Foster from the Presbyterian congregation. We have not heard that he has accepted.

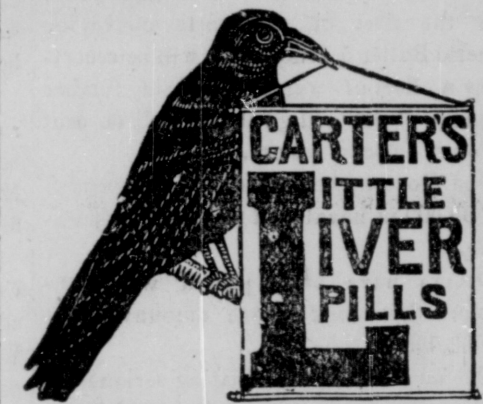
