Britain Blasts Russia As Renewed Crisis Decried

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—Britain Monday attacked the Soviet Union in the United Nations assembly for engineering a "spurious crisis" in the Middle East and cautioned the assembly not to be misled into any action that might further Moscow's propaganda campaign.

Mr. Alan Noble, Britain's minister of state, spoke as the assembly resumed debate on the Syrian border dispute following a weekend recess during which Turkey voted in a general election.

Monday was the date mentioned in Syria and Russia as the likely one for a Turkish attack on Syria, but the day passed without incident in the country.

Noble maintained in his speech that the Syrian border dispute, despite Syrian and Egyptian reports to the contrary, America's delegation sources also said they have received official word of such abandonment.

Syria still appears adamant, however, in its demand that the U.S. should keep the issue before the UN. There is talk here of a move to send Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld or a UN commission to

the area, but no official moves towards this end has come before the assembly.

The United States has been noticeably standing back from the continuing disarmament debate, and in advance of the official submission to the delegates. This plus its timing, coincides with renewal of the Middle East debate, gave it the propaganda edge.

In brief it would switch the talks which hitherto have been held privately by the big four powers and Canada in the submission to a public "little assembly."

The Western subcommittee members have opened public sessions of the working body in the belief that closed meetings kept the discussion from turning into a propaganda battle.

The general Western view is that the Soviet idea would be unworkable. All the powers have scope for their submissions already in the disarmament talks.

In the Middle East debate Monday afternoon Turkey once again accused Syria's charges against her as "fantastic," and proclaimed her determination to resist any Soviet-backed NATO and Baghdad Pact alliances.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker said he knew of no such undertaking adding he had never asked for assurances of Liberal support.

Mr. Diefenbaker said British Prime Minister Macmillan's views on the need for interdependence of the free nations are fully shared by Canada.

Leaders Deny Bargain Made With Gov.-General

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker and Opposition Leader St. Laurent Monday denied there was any bargain last June with Governor-General Massey for Liberal support of the new Progressive Conservative government.

There never was any question of any bargain being made between the Governor-General and the outgoing Liberal administration," Mr. St. Laurent said in the Commons sitting.

The statement by the former prime minister was a denial of a statement made last week by Liberal agriculture minister James G. Gardiner that Mr. St. Laurent had promised Mr. Massey the Liberals would support the incoming Conservative government.

Mr. Diefenbaker replied that "explanation" by Mr. St. Laurent, while welcome, did not meet the situation raised by Mr. Gardiner's remarks.

"There should not have been any mention of the Governor-General in this House," the prime minister said. "That is the first principle of parliamentary government."

Mr. St. Laurent said that when he submitted his government's resignation to Mr. Massey, the Governor-General neither asked for, nor was given, any assurance.

He said he is sure that what Mr. Gardiner had in mind was a meeting with the Governor-General. Mr. St. Laurent had issued that statement on the same day.
