SEVERE WASHOUTS.—The Moncton Times reports that the recent rainstorms have been very bad on the northern division of the I. C. R. from Moncton to Campbellton, and have done much damage. A bad washout extends from the southwest bridge nearly to Chatham Junction on the I. C. R. and caused a delay of nine hours to the Quebec express yesterday morning. The express going west was also delayed at Chatham Junction about four hours. There are other washouts of lesser note, but the one first-mentioned will be a heavy loss to the railway. The Niagara river was a wonderful sight yesterday. At any time a rapid, it was increased to a raging, foaming cataract, and could be heard for a long distance.

A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT

MAN KILLED.

FREDERICTON, Aug. 16. At Morrison's mills yesterday the belt which runs to govern the engine came off, starting the machinery at a prodigious rate of speed. This burst the supping wheel, in which are set a number of knives for peeling bark off cedar logs. The knives flew in all directions. Craig, who was standing about ten feet from the wheel at the time, was struck in the hip with terrible force and hurled to the floor unconscious. McClosky and Ryder were also struck by some of the knives and painfully but not dangerously wounded. Craig died.

News From New Brunswick.

MONCTON, Aug. 16.

The tobacco festival was celebrated by the Acadians at Rogersville yesterday. On her way to chapel a young married woman, wife of Cyrille Caisse, with a number of others, were precipitated into a brook through the fall of a temporary structure, and Mrs. Caisse was drowned.

A Fatal Dispute.

QUEBEC, Aug. 16.

When the steamer Canous left Montreal the captain engaged two men named Roach and Taylor to accompany the cattle to England. A dispute arose as to wages and when off this city the men jumped overboard, and in an attempt to swim ashore Taylor was drowned.

SIMLA, Aug. 16.

The Indian government has informed the Ameer of Afghanistan that if General Robert's mission is not received by Oct. 1st the affair will be regarded as ended, as General Robert will leave India in spring. It is rumored in Gilgit that China has ceded Pamir to Russia.
