

# "Peanuts" Lowrey Is Hero As Cincinnati Halts Dodgers' March

So far as Cincinnati Reds of the National League are concerned Peanuts Lowrey is the hero of the piece today even if Brooklyn Dodgers, with equal right, can look on him as the villain.

It was Peanuts' base-clearing double which yesterday (Wednesday) ended Brooklyn's five-game winning streak and at the same time halted Reds' seven-game losing skid by giving Cincinnati a 6-5 victory.

The result, coupled with St. Louis Cards' 14-6 win from New York Giants, tied the Dodgers and Cards for first place in the National League.

In the American League little Billy Pierce pitched Chicago White Sox to a 3-1 win over Boston Red Sox; Cleveland beat New York Yankees 5-1, and Washington Senators downed Detroit Tigers 12-4.

At Chicago Pierce yielded seven hits in scoring his fifth triumph. Birdie Tebbets' fourth-inning double accounted for the Red Sox' only run. It followed two of seven walks Pierce surrendered. Pierce, a 23-year-old southpaw, struck out eight batters, getting Ted Williams twice. The White Sox got a running start in bagging their ninth American League victory in the last 11 games by hammering starter Joe Dobson for two runs in the first inning. Phil Masi homered to open the fifth inning for the final Chicago score.

A ninth-inning home run by Bobby Brown deprived righthander Early Wynn of a shutout as Cleveland defeated the Yankees before a crowd of 16,737. With Detroit also losing, the Tigers remain a full game ahead of the second-place Yanks in the American League.

Wynn allowed only four hits in gaining his fifth victory against four losses. He had a no-hitter until his mound opponent, Vic Raschi, singled with one out in the sixth inning.

The loss was Raschi's fourth against eight victories. The result squared the series between the two teams at one game apiece.

The Senators hit hard and often today behind Sandalio Consuegra's five-hit pitching as they downed the Tigers for their second straight victory over the American League leaders. Consuegra, 150-pound righthander held the Tigers to three hits through seven innings today as his mates grabbed a 12-3 lead against loser Hal Newhouser and his successors, Paul Calvert and Saul Rogovin.

At Brooklyn, the Reds rallied for three runs in the ninth inning to come from behind and defeat the Dodgers. Don Newcombe had a 5-3 lead going into the ninth and appeared to be on his way to his eighth National League triumph. Manager Burt Shotton yanked him, however, when he walked Bobby Adams, the first man to face him in the ninth. Jack Banta took over and walked Virgil Stallcup on four pitched balls. He threw two more to John Pramesa and was replaced by Clarence Podbielan. Pramesa walked to load the bases.

After Lloyd Merriman forced Adams at the plate, Lowrey came through with his three-run double. Banta was charged with the loss.

The Cardinals ran up the biggest score against the Giants since opening day as manager Eddie Dyer's Redbirds pounded five Giant pitchers for 17 hits, with rookie Bill Howerton, Del Rice and Marty Marion collecting three hits apiece. The loss snapped a four-game Cardinal losing streak.

The first report in the current drive to put over "Big Four" hockey in this Province next year with a local team entry, was given at a special meeting of the campaign committee and divisional commanders held last evening. To date some 1000 subscribers have been received. The general feeling at the meeting was that the campaign has been well received, but that the present returns are still not enough.

This is the last day of the drive and with an objective of 2000 subscribers, the reception today will have to be an all out effort if the necessary quota is to be achieved. Speaking at the meeting, Major T. B. Rogers stated "tomorrow will be the last chance for local fans and it is the hope of the campaigners that the quota will be met." The reception has been good so far but we still have to have more subscribers if we are to make our commitments to the Maritime Senior Hockey League Executive this coming Sunday.

The Island Physical Fitness Baseball League playing schedule has been really taking a beating by the weather during the past few days. Four games have had to be postponed in as many days on account of rain. The most recent ones were yesterday's scheduled tilts between Abbies and Falcons here at Memorial Field and R. C. A. F. Royals and Curran and Briggs at Summerside. The other two rain-outs were the Abbie-C and B clash at Memorial Field and the Falcons-R. C. A. F. tilt at the Western Capital which were both scheduled for last Sunday.

Although the four postponements only constitute two actual playing dates, there are not too many open playing dates, particularly here at Memorial field where the Junior League also sees action at least twice a week, and if there are many more postponements on account of the weather, the league officials are going to have a few headaches in getting things straightened away again. ## Annual Meeting P. E. I. Harness Racing Club

The annual meeting of the P. E. I. Harness Racing Club was held in the City Hall last evening with a good attendance of members.

After the adoption of the minutes of the previous meeting and the financial statement, president Charles Willis called for an open discussion on racing problems. This was taken part in by most of those present, which included Col. D. A. MacKinnon, H. P. Cudmore, George Brookings, Jerry Sheen, Rolfe Wood, Dr. R. F. Seaman, Rankin McLaine, Charles Stewart, Elwood Shaw, Dr. H. McIntyre, George McIntyre; A. B. Cutcliffe, Joe Leslie, Clifford MacDonald, Harold Stead, Bert Younker, E. Frank Acorn, George Gregory, Sam Kennedy, Bill Stevenson, Charles Willis, Hugh Simpson, Dr. George Bishop and D. K. Shaw.

The number of heats to be raced on circuit tracks and the percentage to be charged for entrance were the principal topics.

Some were in favor of three per cent entrance fee, others five per cent, and still others thought that only money winners should be charged. The horse owners' position was clearly shown, and it was pointed out how much more it cost to train, race and feed a horse today than formerly. The track owners' side of the story showed higher costs for practical everything connected with the management of a meeting. The weather problem was also referred to, which means that on an unfavorable day an operator is faced with a possible loss of up to \$1,000 to \$1,500. It was great for both sides to have such matters brought out and discussed harmoniously.

No Decision Reached

No decision was arrived at with reference to the entrance fee and it is probable that all the circuit tracks outside Charlottetown will charge five per cent this season and that racing on most

tracks will be limited to 12 heats except where races are split up.

A strong resolution was proposed and unanimously adopted regarding on member tracks the necessity of dealing firmly with drivers whose actions were likely to cause accidents.

Dr. R. F. Seaman read the constitution of the Prince Edward Island Horsemen's Protective Association, formed for the purpose of taking care of island drivers injured in races. The deduction of two per cent from winnings will make up the fund for this purpose, together with the sum of money now on deposit. All members present were very much in favor of continuing this worthy object.

Prizes Presented

The president's address (it appears in full elsewhere in this issue), which was read very effectively by Charles Willis, was unanimously adopted and afterwards Mr. Willis presented the Hawley Crockett Trophy to the 1949 leading point winner, Harold Cudmore, whose Prince Budlong's total was 131 points. He also received a cash prize for first cash prize for second went to Willard MacDonald whose Vella La Vella scored 115 points and the third prize to Harold Stead whose Buddy Budlong scored 108 points. Fourth prize was awarded to Willard Kelly for Neil Kalmuck's 94 points.

Much sympathy was expressed for driver Clarence Schuman who has been ill for several months and it was decided unanimously to hold a benefit race meet for him on the best available date after Sept. 8.

## Gardella Advised To Drop Action Against Baseball

NEW YORK, June 21 (AP)—Danny Gardella, who had organized baseball's scab last year with his suit aimed at the reserve clause, was advised today by his lawyer to drop any legal action aimed at getting a full year's pay as a major leaguer.

Gardella, a Mexican League jumper taken back into the fold last year after he dropped his \$300,000 anti-trust action, was released unconditionally by St. Louis Cardinals yesterday, and for a time it appeared that he would bounce right back into court.

Gardella wanted to get a full year's salary of \$5,000 as a major leaguer. The Cardinals said his pay will end 30 days after his outright release. After a tryout with the Cardinals he had been shipped to Houston, Tex., and there let go.

Fred G. Moritt of the law firm handling Gardella's affairs said his office "has closed the Gardella case officially as far as lawsuits are concerned. The settlement was made in good faith last fall and both sides have lived up to the agreement.

"The fact that Danny Gardella... was sent to Houston and then released was not the fault of either the St. Louis Club or of Danny Gardella."

## Final Returns In Halifax Election

HALIFAX, June 21 (CP)—With all polls counted, voters in Monday's Federal by-election in Halifax gave Liberal Samuel R. Balcom a total of 25,639 votes, with Lloyd Allen, Progressive Conservative, getting 14,013 and Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson, contesting the seat for the CCF, trailing with 4,952.

A total of 44,604 persons voted, out of approximately 86,000 eligible voters—just slightly over 50 per cent. Approximately 63 per cent of the eligible voters cast ballots in the Federal general elections of 1949 in this constituency.

## Harness Racing In Canada Goes Big League

TORONTO, June 21 (CP)—Canada's harness horse racing usually homespun as a country fair, moves into the big time July 3 with a 42 day meet over a built-in half-mile oval at Thorncliffe Park, on Toronto's northeast fringe.

Thorncliffe Raceway, with Herb Hatch, wealthy Toronto sportsman as its head, will spend more than \$500,000 on the meet before the first sulky moves. Callers of the entries and size of the purses rank with the best United States trot meets.

Purse money totalling \$210,000 already has been put up with the Aug. 9 Canadian Cup for pacers, worth \$15,000 to the winner, the tid-bit of the program. The best standard-breds on the continent, including Jerry the First, winner of the \$50,000 Golden West Pace at Santa Anita park last Saturday, are entered for this event.

When the Raceway promoters finish their face-lifting in the next week or 10 days Thorncliffe will have everything, including an up-to-date trailer camp for the drivers and slick new stables.

The promoters have spent \$100,000 on nine new stables so the track will accommodate 1,100 horses.

They have spent \$100,000 on construction of a half-mile oval built inside Thorncliffe's mile track. In addition, the trotters can "warm up" on a half-mile practice track in the stables area and on another 1-3 mile all-weather strip.

Floodlights have been set up and lamp-post like lights ring the trotting oval. This accounted for another \$100,000 outlay.

The operators who have been on the hunt for a trotting-horse "home" the last two years, have been refused the right to hold night meetings under the lights by the Ontario Racing Commission, but they went ahead with their bright plans "just in case" the O. R. C. changes its mind.
