All Canada Prepares For Mass Polio Inoculations

This chart shows the incidence of polio—before the Salk inoculations—among different age groups. The Salk vaccine, according to the data compiled among the 2,000,000 children in the first mass test, reduces the occurrence of paralytic polio in children from 40 in 100,000 to eight in 100,000. Throughout Canada now authorities are busy putting their plans for mass vaccination into effect.



Complete confidence of Dr. Jonas Salk in his polio vaccine was shown by his inoculation of his own children before the mass vaccination of 2,000,000 schoolchildren which proved the vaccine to be 80-90 per cent effective. He is shown here with his wife and family at the University of Michigan where he went to hear the report gathered by an independent agency headed by Dr. Francis at Ann Arbor, Mich. Left to right, Jonathan, five; Peter, 11, and Darrell, eight. Mrs. Salk is looking over her husband's shoulder. Until the Francis report on the statistics compiled by examining the records of occurrence of polio among the inoculated children, even Dr. Salk did not know how effective his vaccine had proved.
