PHILIP ENERY, for the past few years switchman at the G. T. R. Station, in Guilford, Ontario, drowned himself a few days ago.

COMPARED with the corresponding period last year, the returns show that the number of vacant houses, in Ottawa, this year for the May quarter is only half as great as in 1883.

The Post Office Savings Bank statement for May shows deposits of \$325,199, and withdrawals of \$322,329; balance to credit of depositors, \$12,550,222, as against \$11,433,937 for the same month last year.

A JUBILEE in honor of the 50th birthday of Rev. Chas. H. Spurgeon, was given in London England, on the 18th inst., over five thousand persons being present. Among those who delivered addresses was Mr. Moody.

ACCORDING to the usual custom for several years past, the Odd Fellows of St. John, Portland and Carleton attended divine service on Friday evening last, in commemoration of the laying of the corner stone of their hall, and at the same time observing the anniversary of the great fire of 1877.

The first church dedicated by the new president of the Methodist Conference, in his official capacity was the church on the Conzola Point Road, Rothsay, which was finished last week and dedicated yesterday. The inside finish and indeed the whole building is neat, tasteful and substantial, and in all respects reflects credit on the Methodists of Rothsay.

At a sale of Jersey cattle in New York, on the 18th inst., sixty-eight animals were sold, realizing in all about \$17,000. The highest price paid for a single head was \$900, for a year old cow imported by Mr. Havemeyer. A. B. Darling's three-year-old cow Victoria Darlington brought \$615, John J. Holley's five-year-old cow Golden Horn \$700, and Mr. Havemeyer's nine-year-old cow Fancy Fan \$500.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, Frank Coyle appeared, on warrant, charged with assaulting Mrs. Frank Davies, in her own house, Queen street. A Mrs. McLean appeared, charged with assaulting Mrs. McKinnon with a broomstick. The evidence was so conflicting that the Magistrate was obliged to adjourn this case for further evidence. One drunk was disposed of, and four sailors who deserted from the bark Syrian Star were remanded until to-morrow.

THE Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has issued its first crop report of the season. It covers 358 townships, out of 476 in the Province of Ontario, and declares the crops about 75 per cent. more than last year. 323 townships report over 240,000 acres of wheat. Oats have largely decreased. The condition of all the crops on the 1st of June is reported good, except for want of rain in a few places, where it has since fallen. The probability now is that the wheat crop of the Northwest will reach two millions bushels more than last year.

The closing exercises at the Convent de Notre Dame take place in the spacious Hall of the institution on the 27th inst. On that occasion a grand concert will be given by the pupils. Heretofore the public concerts given in the Convent de Notre Dame were pronounced to be grand musical events, and as there are many clever musicians attending the school this season we have no doubt that the concert on the 27th instant will be no less successful. A programme will, in due time, be published.

THE Canadian steamer Eugenie, from Montreal, Capt. Carron, collided on the night of the 18th, off Bay Bulls, N.B., with a monster iceberg, and narrowly escaped destruction with all hands on board. She lost main sails, stanchion bulwarks, fore topmast, bowsprit, jibboom and windlass, and the hull was terribly shattered. The crew left her boarded her again, and at daylight a tug seeing signals of distress boarded her and towed her to an anchorage. Steamer Petunia reports passing in lat 3.15 north, lon 66.11 west, a new ship, copper sheathed, bottom up, on the 1st inst.

PERSONS living in the neighborhood of Hillsborough Park state that the pump in that vicinity has recently been turned into a miniature warehouse for the storage of old boots, whiskey bottles, and other refuse matter. As a consequence the pumps almost always out of repair, and the services of the contractor constantly in demand. An investigation shows that the temporary uselessness is invariably the result of the same cause—an overdose of boots, bottles, etc. Every person knows that the water in the city wells is led enough, without being made worse by such vile poisons as arise from rusty boots and Charlotte-town whiskey. Persons having a surplus quantity of such refuse on hand are hereby notified that there is room for a few more cartloads at the breastwork, near the Gas Works.

Another Indian Sensation.

WINNIPEG, June 21. A despatch from Battleford says that the Indians on Pound Makers' Reserve seized and beat a Government official, and broke into the Government store and stole provisions. About fifty mounted police sent from Battleford to arrest them were set at defiance and a fight was expected. The people of Battleford are arming for self-defence.

A Wife Murdered.

BOSTON, June 22. Enos Diamond, of St. John, who has been recently living in Charlottetown assaulted his wife with an axe this morning fracturing her skull and probably fatally injuring her. He alleges infidelity on the part of his wife and says he intended to kill her.

European Notes.

VIENNA, June 21. Five men have been arrested at Polo, having dynamite in their possession. Excessive rains and inundations in Galicia have suspended railway traffic business. It is rumored that 250 soldiers were drowned.

Murder of a Landlord.

NEW YORK, June 22. Peter McCormack, a wealthy resident of Hunter's Point, was shot dead to-day by Patrick Kernan. McCormack had threatened to eject Kernan for non-payment of rent.

Terrible Explosion.

ROME, June 22. The Powder Mills at Dintremoli exploded to-day. Thirty persons were killed and seventeen wounded.

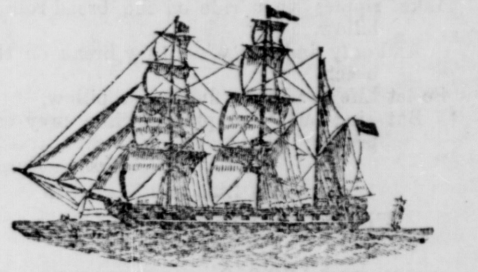

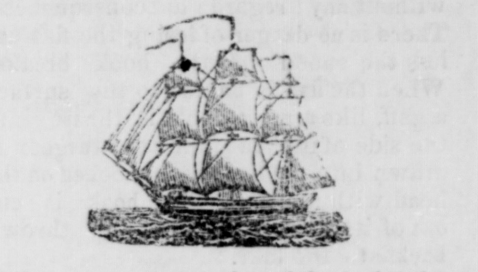
