LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

GREATLY ADMIRER.—The jolly tars of H. M. S. Rambler who marched in the procession yesterday were greatly admired, especially by the ladies.

RELEASED ON BAIL.—Michael Power, who was on Monday sent up for trial in the Supreme Court for interfering with the police and assaulting John Crowley, has been released on bail.

ST. PETERS DAY SCHOOL.—The prizes will be distributed by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor on Thursday at 8 o'clock. Friends and all interested in education are invited to attend.

THEY SAW THE QUEEN.—Among those present at Victoria Park yesterday afternoon were at least two persons who saw Her Majesty in London at the time of her coronation sixty years ago. These gentlemen were Dr. Leeming and Mr. Joseph Knight. The occurrence is still fresh in their memories.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon Hannah Maher was sentenced to six months with hard labor for keeping a disorderly house. James Gilboy and Peter Gilboy were each fined \$20 or two months imprisonment for breaking the windows of Angus MacDonald's store on Queen Street. James Gilboy, for stealing a hammer, was given thirty days extra.

Fifteen drunks were fined in sums ranging from \$1 or 5 days to \$4 or 20 days. None of the fines carried costs.

COMMITTED TO THE EARTH.—The funeral of Mr. Joseph Kent, for several years past proprietor of the North American Hotel, took place this forenoon to the Roman Catholic Cemetery. A large number of citizens paid the last tribute of respect. Mr. Kent was stricken with paralysis about a year ago, and for a time his life was despaired of. On Monday morning he suffered a second shock, from which he died the same afternoon. He leaves a wife and several small children to mourn the loss of a good husband and father.

ACCIDENTALLY INJURED.—During the progress of the fireworks exhibition last evening a falling rocket struck Master Willie McKie on the throat causing severe injuries. The accident occurred on Richmond Street, in the vicinity of the Brown Block. The little fellow was bleeding profusely when he was taken into Reddin's drugstore, where everything possible was done for him. Master McKie is a son of Mr. James R. McKie, and is about fifteen years of age. He is reported somewhat easier to-day, and his early recovery is hoped for.

ST. DUNSTON'S COLLEGE.—The closing exercises of St. Dunstan's College took place in St. Patrick's Hall on Monday evening. His Lordship Bishop McDonald presided and with him on the platform were Lieut.-Governor Howlan, D. J. McLeod, Superintendent of Education, and a number of clergymen. The exercises throughout were very interesting. The degree of B. A. of Laval was conferred on Messrs. J. A. Ready, Stephen R. Bourke and Joseph Gallant. The valedictory by Mr. Ready was well written, and proved most interesting. Rev. A. E. Bourke, of Alberton, was the orator. A summary of his remarks prepared for to-day's issue is unavoidably crowded out. Before the National Anthem was sung short addresses were made by the chairman and Lieut.-Governor Howlan and Mr. McLeod.

NEWS NOTES.

The Winnipeg Tribune calls Mr. Laurier's a progressive Government. It is making great progress in conceiving money-spending and debt-creating schemes.

Brothers and other relatives of Barney Barnato are turning up all over this continent. Claiming kinship with the dead speculator is one of the cheapest ways of getting a notoriety seeker's name into the cheap press.

Mrs. Blackman of Cleveland, Ohio, who claims to be the legitimate daughter of Barney Barnato, says she will at once take steps to acquire a share of his fortune. Mrs. Blackman claims to be a daughter of Barnato by his first wife, whose maiden name was Anna Esther. Secretary Honey of Barney Barnato's Companies, says that the claim of Mrs. Blackman to be a daughter of the late South African speculator, is preposterous, as Barnato was on'y once married.

The Bank of Toronto, like other institutions, reports having had to contend during the past year with a commercial depression, created largely by political events in the United States and Canada. In the face of these conditions it earned, however, \$8,000 more than its 10 per cent. dividend and was able to strengthen its profit and loss account. The Imperial Bank, out of the profits of the past year, paid 9 per cent. to its stockholders, besides writing \$11,800 off its bank premises account. It carries \$53,393 forward to the credit of profit and loss. The Imperial has opened an agency at Revelstoke, B. C. Both these banks have come well through the dull period, and are both in a position to profit by the recovery of trade that all hope is not distant.
