The Halifax Holocaust.

HALIFAX, Nov. 8. It has been ascertained on reliable authority that by the burning of the Provincial Poor Asylum, a mile and a half from this City, yesterday morning, thirty-one or more of the inmates were roasted alive. The scene was heart-rending. Every effort was made by the firemen to rescue the inmates from the terrible death, but the flames spread so rapidly through the building that it was impossible to save all. The loss is estimated at \$80,000. The institution was insured for \$10,000. [An account of the terrible disaster, as telegraphed to the St. John Telegraph, will be found on our first page.]

Foster Elected in King's.

MONCTON, Nov. 8. Prof. Foster was yesterday elected in King's by a majority of nearly three hundred votes over his opponent, Mr. Denville.

Frightful Explosion.

LONDON, Nov. 8. A frightful explosion occurred in Clayross Colliery, Derbyshire, yesterday morning. Thirty miners were instantly killed and over sixty seriously wounded.

Probable Dissolution of Parliament.

LONDON, Nov. 9. It is generally believed in political circles that Cloture will result in the dissolution of the British Parliament.

Russia Making Mischiefs.

LONDON, Nov. 8. A correspondent of the Times at Constantinople writes that the Russian Government is urging the Porte to send a high Commissioner to Egypt, on board a Turkish man-of-war, to make a naval demonstration.

Dufferin at Alexandria.

ALEXANDRIA, Nov. 8. Lord Dufferin, British Ambassador, arrived here, en route to Cairo, yesterday. He was cordially received by the Egyptian authorities. He proceeded to Cairo today.

[Lord Dufferin has been selected to conduct the Egyptian negotiations and look after the settlement of the country. After the Malets and Colvins and official under-estimates with which Egypt has been overrun, she is lucky to obtain the services of a statesman whose game with the Sultan in delaying the military convention be long to the highest range of diplomatic comedy. For the liberal policy in Egypt must be a policy of procrastination. There are vested interests to be satisfied; there are financial vultures to be choked off; there is an army of office holders to be dismissed; there are the jealousies of foreign nations to be allayed; there is the Suez Canal to be guarded; and that which Lord Dufferin must seek before all will be the best method of withdrawing the influence of Great Britain, of persuading Europe to show a similar forbearance and of then leaving Egypt to her own devices, independent, self-governed, neutral, the Belgium of the East.—Herald.]

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. Among the opinions handed down by the General Term, to-day, were decisions in the cases of Williams vs. Western Union Telegraph Company, and Hatch vs. the same company, in which judgments rendered by Judge Frazar, sustaining the action of the company in absorbing the American Union and Atlantic and Pacific and issuing a stock dividend of fifteen millions, are reversed and the whole scheme branded as illegal.

LONDON, Nov. 6. In the Commons, to-night, the debate on the closure question was resumed. Right Hon. Lord John Manners, Conservative, offered an amendment providing that any division upon closure shall be taken by secret ballot. Rejected. On the Speaker putting the first resolution (the closure rule) Sir Stafford Northcote moved its rejection.

LONDON, Nov. 6. A despatch from Copenhagen says uneasiness is felt there in consequence of the report that Nomads of the northwest coast of Siberia have seen a wrecked steamer, as the Danish Polar steamer Dymphna is known to be icebound in that region.

TUNIS, Nov. 6. The new Bey's Cabinet will be under the Presidency of Silazasis Bey. M. Cambon will be Minister of Foreign Affairs; General Gergemol, Minister of War, and General Legerol, Minister of Marine. It is believed that General Lambert will have charge of the Department of the Interior.

PORTLAND, Me., Nov. 6. A fire to-day burned out a number of firms on Commercial street and along the wharves. Assistance was asked and received from neighboring towns. The total loss will probably reach \$400,000. The Portland Fish Packing Company are heavy losers.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 6. A most violent storm prevailed through the country last night and this morning. Much damage was done on land and several shipwrecks are reported.

BOSTON, Nov. 6. Hall & Co., commission merchants, have suspended. Liabilities about \$350,000.

CAIRO, Nov. 6. Arabi's counsel say they have reason to believe that when the translation of his papers is completed the documents will prove that he received direct encouragement from the Sultan, and that he had the unanimous support of the Egyptians, and the sanction of their religious representatives. Among the papers is the text of the Sultan's firman, dated 23rd June, confirming the order of Mejidie upon Arabi in recognition of his zeal, honesty and intelligence.

LONDON, Nov. 6. The Times Berlin correspondent writes

graphs that Russian diplomacy is making great efforts to influence France to unite with Russia in a policy unfriendly to England.

The Standard's Frankfurt correspondent says important diplomatic negotiations are in progress between Russia and France. If France accedes to the wishes of Russia in reference to the proposed extradition treaty and limits the protection to be extended to political refugees, Russia will support the entire North African policy of France, and more particularly her policy in regard to questions pending in Egypt and Tunis.

Rudolph Hoffman, the historical painter, is dead.

The Times' Madrid correspondent telegraphs that the menacing language of the English press toward Spain, in regard to the Cuban refugees, has caused a painful impression in government circles, and aroused a strong feeling of indignation among the people.

The beet root crop will be about equal to that of 1881. The yield of sugar is estimated at about 400,000 tons.

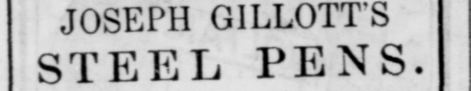

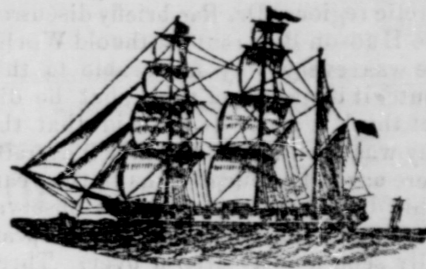
