## A BREACH MADE IN BRITISH LEGATION. All the Foreigners Reported Killed.

DETAILS OF HORRIBLE STORY MAY NEVER BE KNOWN.

A Suggestive Despatch From Sir Robert Hart.

SHANGHAI, July 16.—An official telegram was received to night from Governor of Sha Tung, stating that a breach was made in the wall of the British Legation at Peking after a gallant defence, and when their ammunition had given out all the foreigners were killed.

LONDON, July 16.—The following despatches from Admiral Seymour were published this evening:—

"TIEN TSIN, July 9.—The enemy's position in the southwest settlement was attacked at four this morning. The Japanese by a flank movement drove the enemy out and captured four guns. The cavalry pursued and completed the rout of enemy, killing large numbers of soldiers and Boxers.

"The allied forces shelled and occupied the western arsenal, capturing two guns. The arsenal was burned as the allies were unable to hold it. The enemy's loss was 350 killed. The loss of the allied force was small."

TIEN TSIN, July 12.—The Chinese, at 3 a. m. yesterday, made a determined attack upon the railway station in great force. Finally they were driven off at six a. m., but the allies lost 150 killed and wounded.

The Chinese loss is unknown but is believed to have been heavy. The forts were bombarded at noon by the British and French guns. The fort and a pagoda used as a signal tower were demolished.

The allied forces have been increased by the arrival of 1,500 Americans.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Secretary Hay has received an undated despatch from Consul General Goodnow, at Shanghai, stating that the Governor of Honan, F. Shan, has issued a proclamation favorable in its terms to the Boxers.

LONDON, July 16.—It seems impossible to entertain any longer the least doubt as to the fate of the Europeans in Peking. The Associated Press learns that Lady Hart, the wife of Sir Robert Hart, director of the Chinese Imperial Marine Customs on July 5th received a telegram from her husband saying: "Our people including the women are in the Legation. Prepare to hear the worst."

The European governments have received from their representatives at Shanghai a despatch from the governor of Sha Tung, dated July 7, reporting that the European troops made a sortie from Peking and killed 200 of Gen Tung Fhu Siang's force and that the Boxers were mounting guns to make a breach in the defences.

Under date of July 12th Governor of Sha Tung wires as follows:

"Native soldiers and Boxers have been attacking the legations for some hours but have not effected an entrance. They are now all bombarding with large cannon to make a breach for a heavy onslaught. I fear that all the ministers and the Government as well are in great danger. The Government is intensely anxious."

Finally there came news from Shanghai that a breach had been made and the foreigners killed.

All the dates given probably refer to a much earlier period, but the presumption is that the successive despatches gave an outline of what has happened. The Europeans having reached the end of their resources made a desperate sortie and then bravely met their fate.

The details of the horrible story will probably never be known.

### Rioting in Belfast.

BELFAST, Ireland, July 14.—A riot occurred here last evening when a party of Nationalists tried to demolish an orange triumphal arch. The attempt was followed by a fight in the course of which women took part by handing stones to the combatants. The police charged the rioters and dispersed them. A sergeant and several constables were severely wounded.

### Forty Thousand Russian Troops

LONDON, July 14.—A despatch to the Standard from Odessa says that more than 40,000 troops have been despatched during the past 10 days from Moscow overland to Khabarovsk. It is added that it is intended to raise the army in the Amur Government, Central Asia, to 200,000 men.

### Italians for China.

ROME, July 13.—A contingent of troops for China will leave Naples July 18. According to the Tribuna a second contingent, which like the first, will be composed of two battalions, will be sent. The expeditionary corps will thus be raised to five thousand men.

### Snow Eight Feet Deep.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., July 14.—An unusually early winter, with floods of unprecedented severity, is causing great loss throughout this colony. Telegraphic communication is interrupted, train loads of passengers are snowbound, and freight traffic is paralyzed. In many parts of the country snow stands eight feet deep.

### Cattle Dying by Thousands.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 14.—Reports from the drought stricken sections of Arizona are to the effect that every water hole and most of the wells have gone dry. Cattle are dying by thousands and the shrunken frames dot the desert country of Pima, Pinal, Santa Cruz, Yuma Cochise and parts of Maricopa counties. Not a crop is reported in the gila and Casa Grande the immense reservoir is dry.

### A Blaze at St. Paul.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 14.—Fire, which broke out in the Chicago Great Western Railroad shops at South Park yesterday afternoon, destroyed seven buildings used as storehouses. The loss, it is estimated, will be from \$100,000 to \$150,000. The buildings were filled with shingles.

### A Disappearing Island.

Vancouver, B. C., July 14.—Upon the return of H. M. S. "Porpoise" from Tonga, the commander reported that Falcon Island, which disappeared in 1898, has again appeared. The shape of the returned island is like a whale's back, and it is considered to be a serious danger to navigation. Falcon Island is said to owe its disappearance to submarine volcanic activity. Its situation is south-west of the Friendly Islands.
