Seasoning Tricks In Cooking Perk Up Bland Tasting Food

To make cooked fresh or frozen vegetables tasty without adding butter, margarine, cream, a rich sauce or some other form of fat, calls for a few tricks.

NATURAL FLAVOR
You've gone a long way in producing tastiness when the vegetables are cooked to conserve their own natural flavors.

Three ways to do this are by the waterless cooking method, pressure-cooking, or by cooking small-cut, thin-sliced or julienne vegetables until bite-tender, in 1 in. of boiling salted water.

SEASONING TRICKS
For bland vegetables such as white potatoes, green lima beans, black-eyed peas, zucchini and summer squash, add one or two beef bouillon cubes or teaspoons of broth powder, according to the quantity of cooking liquid used; or season the cooking vegetables with one of the herb salts, such as rosemary, dill, celery, onion salt or a little garlic salt.

Try braising squash (summer or winter varieties), carrots, turnips or parsnips in tomato or vegetable juice, with a few dried mint flakes for piquancy.

LEMON JUICE
Braise celery, endive and turnip in canned beef bouillon along with a tablespoon of lemon juice.

All greens and "sweet" root vegetables, as well as asparagus, benefit by seasoning with fresh lime or lemon juice.

For a change, cook fresh or frozen green peas, asparagus, green beans or sliced carrots in reconstituted instant non-fat milk crystals to half cover, in a double-boiler. Season when done with salt, pepper, a taste of nutmeg and dust with snipped parsley.

Spark dull-flavored vegetables by cooking with high-flavored vegetables such as celery, sliced mushrooms and green peppers.

Quick bake potatoes, for a luscious, tasty flavor. To do this, scrub and cut in halves. Place cut-side down on a foil-lined pan. Bake half the usual time.

TOMORROW'S DINNER
Green Bean-Green Pepper Saladettes
Hot smoked Beef Platter
Bouillon Cooked Potatoes
Broccoli
Peach Meringue Cakelets
Coffee Tea Milk
Measurements are level unless noted.

Peach Meringue Cakelets: in bowl blend 1/4 c. corn oil, 1/4 c. sugar, 1 well-beaten egg and 1/4 tsp. vanilla until smooth and fluffy.

Mix together 1 1/2 c. pre-sifted enriched flour, 1-3 tsp. salt and 1/2 tsp. baking powder. Add to first mixture alternately with 1/2 c. skim milk. Transfer to oiled shallow muffin pans.

Bake 20 min. in mod. oven, 375 degrees F. Do not remove from pan.

Peel and small-dice enough peaches to make 2 c.
Beat 3 egg whites until peaks form; gradually beat in 1-3 c. sifted powdered sugar and 1 tsp. lemon juice. Fold in peaches. Spread atop baked cakes.
Return to oven, 325 degrees F. Bake 12 min. or until meringue is lightly browned.
Serve warm or cold the day they are baked.
Makes 8 cakelets that are low in fat yet delicious.

TRICK OF THE CHEF
Toss in 1 tbsp. French onion soup mix with each pound of spinach before cooking.
