Bathing in Warm Water.

The Sanitary World considers cleanliness not only essential to good health, but also a mark of good breeding. The workman, by the clinging of dust to his perspiring person, becomes a fit subject for the bath tub very frequently; too frequent bathing, however, is weakening. It may not be advisable to take a bath morning and evening, as some medical journals advise; but their should be a good washing frequently enough to keep the person clean. Warm baths will often prevent the most virulent diseases. A person who may be in fear of having received infection of any kind should take a warm bath suffer perspiration to ensue, and then rub dry. He is advised to dress warmly to guard against taking cold. If the system has imbedded any infectious matter, it will be removed by resorting to the warm bath if the latter is taken before the infection has time to spread over the system; and even if some time has elapsed, the drenching perspiration that may be induced by hot water will be very certain to remove it. In cases of congestion bilious colic, inflammation, &c., there is no remedy more certain to give relief than a hot bath. In cases of obstinate constipation also, wonderful cures have been wrought. For sore throat, diphtheria, and inflammation of the lungs a hot compress is one of the most potent remedies.

A Magnetised Corset.

That lady may have trouble with their watches, even if they take care not to bring them near a dynamo, is shown by the following story told by the Electrical World:—A young woman of Columbus, Ga., about to visit the station of the electric light company was told to leave her watch at home lest it be magnetised by the strong electric current. She did so, but complained afterwards that her watch would not keep good time. She sent it to a jeweller, but he reported that it was not magnetised, and kept good time. She, however, she carried it, her time was slow, although when she left it in her room it ran correctly. A gentleman who knew of the circumstance suggested to the young lady that she wear another pair of corsets when next she carried the watch. The steel springs in her corsets had been magnetised.

On the Transplantation of Teeth.

Experiments have recently been made by Dr. Younger, of San Francisco, on the subject of the transplantation of teeth, with a view to their growth in the new position. It would appear that, if proper precautions be taken to secure perfect apposition and cleanliness, the operation is often attended with success, and possesses many advantages over the use of false teeth. The inflammation of the gums, however, is somewhat persistent, and constitutes a drawback, from the inconvenience which results therefrom. Recourse to this method is more particularly indicated when the teeth to be replaced are front teeth, and essential both for appearance' sake, and for perfect articulation.—British Medical Press.
