Tuxis Parliament Is Continued

SACKVILLE, N. B., Dec. 29.—(CP)—Resolutions deploring lack of leadership in churches, condemning the prevalence of indecent literature and urging young people to take greater interest in mission work were approved here today by the 30th Maritime Tuxis and Older Boys Parliament.

During the evening session a report was given of the share selling campaign conducted during the past year for funds to carry on a boys work program. The drive netted \$4,030, a substantial increase over the objective of \$3,200 and congratulations were extended to the Trail Rangers of Steeves Memorial United Church in Moncton who won the Marven Shield, emblematic of selling honors in the drive.

The resolutions held that young people are prospective church leaders and as such should be encouraged by their elders to prevent youth from drifting from the churches; that "careful and judicious examination" be made by competent authorities of the literature available to youth today and that all young people learn of mission and accept their share of financial and personal responsibility.

At the formal opening of the House today a delegation from the Maritime Canadian Girls in Training Council was present and official greetings were extended by Miss Helen Croebie of Halifax, council president.
