LORD SALISBURY MAKES A SPEECH

Says There Will be no Foreign Interference.

Transports ordered to Durban with an Army Brigade—The reason of the Losses of the Gordon Highlanders at Ladysmith.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—At the Lord Mayor's banquet last night, Lord Salisbury in rising received a great ovation. He said in opening:

I have had to answer, for many years, similar kinds of reception in this hall, but never before under conditions that justified me in appealing so confidently to your sympathy and support as in the present grave state of public affairs.

Before turning to this serious point, my duty is to inform you that our situation in South Africa is the only part of our relations with other nations to which any term of apprehension or doubt can be applied.

For several years our relations and cordial feelings towards our kinsmen on the other side of the Atlantic have constantly grown, and though neither do we interfere in the affairs of their continent nor they interfere in the affairs of ours, we feel that we can now always look for the sympathy and a fair hearing among those who share with us so vast a mission for the advancement of mankind.

But, perhaps you think I am sanguine in saying that on the continent of Europe we have no hostility to fear. There is, undoubtedly, a certain acerbity of tone among the writers for the foreign press; but I don't believe that the trend of this opinion affects the peoples of foreign nations. I am quite certain that it does not affect their Governments, and I will say that I have noted, as one of the cheering symptoms of the present time, the happy relations existing between the United States and ourselves, (cheers.) and the sympathy with which we watch their approach towards the same great problems that we ourselves have had to solve.

After setting forth the cause of the present war, Lord Salisbury said that it must be carried to a successful issue. No interference must be tolerated, he said. What we desire is equal rights for all men of all races, and the security of our fellow subjects and empire.

The hour of knowing by what means these results can be obtained is not yet come; but these are the objects and only objects we seek. We do not allow any other consideration to cross our path. I have seen it stated that other powers will interfere with this country, and in some form or other indicate to those who are concerned in it as to what its upshot should be. Don't let any man think it is in that fashion that the conflict will be completed. We shall have to carry it through ourselves and the influence of anybody else will have no effect upon it, (cheers) in the first place because we would not accept that interference, and in the second place because we are convinced that there is no such idea in the mind of any Government in the world.

Whenever we are victorious we shall consult the vast interests committed to our care. Vast duties lie upon us to perform, and taking counsel of the uniform conditions of our colonial governments of moderation and equal rights to all races of men, which it has been our uniform practice to observe, I do not doubt we shall so arrange that the issue of this conflict will confer good government on the area where it rages, and give a security sorely needed against the return of any such dangers, and the necessity of any such future exertions, and

also for the restoration of peace and civilization in that part of the world.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The order for the transport Rosslyn Castle to go to Durban instead of Cape Town, as originally intended, is regarded as important. She carries General Hildyard, the commander of the second brigade, and about a thousand men, in addition to large quantity of stores. The change in her destination is taken to mean that the second brigade is going to relieve General White at Ladysmith. Four transports are conveying the remainder of this brigade, about due at Cape Town.

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 10.—Many of the Gordon Highlanders who were wounded at Elandsbaagte have arrived here. The majority of them declare that they were shot after the Boers had exhibited four flags of truce, and the British bullets had sounded the "cease firing." The Highlanders admit that their heavy loss was due to their action in unanimously refusing their commander's offer to let them fight without their tartans.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The cablegram from Durban states that the warships Thetis and Terrible have arrived there. They will probably land guns which will be sent to Pietermaritzburg under escort, and an attempt may be made to send a battalion with guns to Colesburg and even as far north as Ladysmith.

MORE BOER TREACHERY.

Ladysmith Heard From.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The British War Office has received from General Buller the following despatch:—

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 9.—I have received by pigeon post from General White today the following: "Bombardment from long range, by heavy guns, continues daily. A few casualties are occurring, but no serious harm is being done. The Boers sent in today a number of refugees from the Transvaal under a flag of truce."

"A flag of truce from Ladysmith met them at the outside pickets. When the party separated the Boer guns fired on it before it reached our pickets. Major Gale of the Royal Engineers was wounded while sending a message to-day. The entrenchments are daily growing stronger and the supply of provisions is ample."

Reported Capture of Cecil Rhodes.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—The Figaro asserts that Cecil Rhodes was captured in one of the sorties out of Kimberley.
