Valleyfield Stream Gravel Washing Draws Petition

During the past few weeks there has been considerable discussion in Montague and vicinity regarding the Valleyfield stream, and its present condition owing to gravel washing operations. It has been stated that this stream, one of the best fishing streams in the Province, has been ruined through gravel washing.

Attempts are presently under way to have this gravel washing unit removed from the stream, and strong resolutions have been submitted from the Southern Kings Fish and Game Association and the Montague Junior Board of Trade. It is suggested that should this condition be permitted to continue, that not only will the Valleyfield stream be ruined for ever, but no other stream on the Island will be immune to gravel washing operations; with the consequence that eventually there will not be a stream left fit for fish and game.

The following is a petition from the residents of Montague and vicinity to the Provincial Government dealing with this question:

PETITION
Premier Alexander Matheson and the Hon. Dougald McKinnon Minister of Industry and Natural Resources.

We, the undersigned, being residents of Montague and vicinity, do hereby protest against the washing of gravel in the Montague River and its tributaries, in as much as it creates an unsightly annoyance, is harmful and destructive. This river and its branches have been some of the best trout waters found in Prince Edward Island until the washing of gravel was started some years ago. The silt and refuse from the gravel has been washed into the river with the result that the river bed is covered with silt to some depth filling in the spawning beds of the trout and roiling the streams to such an extent that young trout fry cannot survive.

Sudden Death Of Georgetown Man Yesterday

Mr. Thomas F. Renton, a member of the Town Council of Georgetown, succumbed to a heart attack shortly after 10 p.m. last evening. The late Mr. Renton collapsed from the street about half a block from his home as he was returning from attending a meeting of the Town Council which was called to organize a volunteer fire brigade and which was attended by Mr. T.A. Campbell, Provincial Fire Marshal.

The late Mr. Renton was a retired Canadian National Railway locomotive engineer, and had served on numerous Town Councils and was a former member of the Board of School Trustees. He was a member of St. David's United Church and at the time of his death held the office of chairman of the trustee board.

The deceased was active in Church, civic and school affairs for many years and his sudden passing comes as a shock not only to the residents of Georgetown but to those of the Province where he was widely known.

At the time of writing funeral arrangements had not been completed.

BLUEBERRIES
M. Bell asked the Minister how the blue berry experiments turned out.

The Minister said they had turned out very well indeed but not enough people have become interested in this phase of agriculture. He said that one man had bought 1,000 acres of land near Souris and expected to have between two and three hundred acres coming into production this year. He told of another plot at Ten Mile House.

The Minister was pleased to report that on an experimental plot of three fifths of an acre at Donaldston, the owner was able to grow 3,200 lbs. of blue berries. Another plot at Cape Wolfe was able to grow berries as big as cherries and he understood he had to protect his crop with a shotgun.

FORESTRY
Mr. Cullen said the Department

has two graduate forestry engineers in the person of Mr. Gaudet and Mr. Profit who are doing splendid work. They have developed a nursery at Beach Grove which for its size is the best in Canada.

He said that millions of trees would be available this year for planting throughout the Province. Already reforestation projects have been carried out at Ashton, Kings County; Iona, St. Teresas, Mount Pleasant. White Pine has been found the best grower so far, he said.

DAIRY INDUSTRY
The Minister reported that a record amount of dairy products had been produced during the past year. He noted that the support from the districts in which the strength has been a great source of strength to the industry "specialize in dairy farming have not been near" hard "it as those engaged in the more risky methods of farming," he said.

4-H CLUBS
Mr. Cullen highly commended the work being done by the 4-H Clubs throughout the Province. These boys and girls have put on some inspiring shows particularly when there were several clubs in competition against the other.
