Charlottetown Board of Trade.

The meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade for organization has been adjourned until after the jubilee festivities. We trust that everything necessary to the establishment of the Board upon a proper basis will then be done.

Then, in cases of dispute, requiring arbitration, the law invests a properly constituted Board of Trade with power to appoint arbitrators whose decisions are legally binding.

Above all, the Board of Trade, if properly constituted and managed, will cultivate what is so much needed—an intelligent public opinion upon subjects of material importance.

The discussions held by it will be independent of party. Questions will be considered on their own merits; and we may hope that the men who come to take part in the discussions of the Board of Trade will, as practical men, provide themselves with facts and arguments in support of the conclusions which they may wish the Board to draw.

We sincerely hope that the adjourned meeting of the Board of Trade, to be held on the evening of the fourth of July, will be largely attended, and that the Board will be organized by the election of officers carefully selected from among our most active and intelligent men for business.

The Jubilee Celebration.

HALIFAX and St. John have won credit and applause by their hearty and patriotic celebration of the Queen's Jubilee.

Committees are busily engaged in perfecting arrangements for the festivities of the 30th June and the first July; and we have assurances of a "grand success."

FRIDAY, JULY 1

Commencing at 9 o'clock, a. m.

1st Race—Single scull, best 2nd best boats, three miles with one turn—1st Prize, \$25; 2nd, do, \$10. Entrance, \$3.

2nd Race—Lapstreak double-scull boats, three miles with turn—1st Prize, \$15; 2nd do, \$8. Entrance, \$2.

3rd Race—Four-oared boats, three miles with turn—1st Prize, \$35; 2nd do, \$15. Entrance, \$5.

4th Race—Single scull for boys under 18 years of age, two miles with turn—1st Prize, \$10; 2nd do, \$4. Entrance, \$1.50.

5th Race—Single scull lapstreak wherry boats, two miles with turn—1st Prize, \$12; 2nd do, \$7. Entrance, \$2.

6th Race—Sail boats under 21 feet keel—1st Prize, \$35; 2nd do, \$15. Entrance, \$5.

7th—Swimming Race, 150 yards, contestants in costume—1st Prize, \$5; 2nd do, \$1. Entrance, 50 cts.

The above races will be started from Connolly's Wharf, where a grand stand will be erected. No second prizes will be awarded in any of the races unless three boats enter.
