TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, June 28. Forster, Chief Secretary for Ireland, will receive a deputation representing Irish agricultural laborers on the first of July, when a statement in regard to their condition will be laid before him.

The Times says the attitude of the Parnellites threaten indirect, if not direct, obstruction aimed at the defeat of the Land Bill.

Steamer Faraday picked up and buoyed the end of the new cable off Lands End to-day and proceeded for Newfoundland to complete the laying of the cable.

Ennis, a policeman, who, it is alleged, killed Maloney, a farmer, during a recent wit-servicing riot at Bodyke, has been committed for trial.

A banquet is to be given Parnell by the Irish Parliamentary party next week. It will be strictly private and non-political.

The News, commenting on Gladstone's notice of motion to give the Land Bill precedence over the other orders, says: "We cannot close our eyes to the immense strain and burden about to be placed upon Gladstone's strength, and the danger not only to the bill but to the nation and the ministry of its being overtaxed."

Gladstone's motion that after Wednesday the several stages of the Land Bill shall have precedence over the other orders of business wherever the bill appears on the notice paper until the House shall decide, was adopted without a division.

A meeting of the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway has approved the leasing of the Toronto Grey & Bruce Railway. The President, Sir Henry Tyler, stated that the Grand Trunk Railway Company would begin its next half year with £23,000 to the good.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28. Japan advices state the prospects of the silk crop are good.

The construction of the railway between Taungra and Kashua Kanagawa will be commenced immediately.

Christianity is rapidly spreading, particularly in the eastern districts.

Advices from China state that there was considerable disturbance at Peking in the shape of anti-foreign demonstrations, but the place is now quiet. Official proclamations forbid hostility to foreigners.

The tea market opened earlier than was expected.

At Foo Chow the German and Chinese gunboats have gone in pursuit of Chinese pirates who attacked the German ship Occident.

ATHENS, June 28. It is officially reported that the English Delimitation Commissioners have advised Greece to occupy Arta in force, as difficulties are very probable.

BERLIN, June 28. The Emperors of Germany and Austria will probably meet at Gastein in autumn. No special importance need be attached to the interview.

UNITED STATES. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., June 28. In a fight between the farmers and stock men in Searcy county, who drove their cattle from Missouri into the ranges, in Searcy county, Ark., one stock man was fatally shot and others more or less dangerously wounded. Two farmers were also wounded.

LOUISVILLE, June 28. Prof. Klein, of Hartford, Ky., claims he discovered the comet last September. He says this is the comet of 1783.

WASHINGTON, June 28. An approximate orbit of the comet has been computed by Mr. Upton, of the Signal Service, from observations made at the Naval observatory on the 23rd, 24th and 26th instants. The elements show a marked agreement with those of the great comet of 1807, making it probable the two are identical. The comet is about 27,000,000 miles from the earth and is rapidly receding from it and approaching the sun, the perihelion passage occurring about July 1st.

Internal Revenue Commissioner Reim has decided that the Bank of Montreal must pay a tax on capital and upon all amounts sent to its Chicago branch in that city.

CHICAGO, June 28. The Lumber Dealers Exchange advanced prices all along the line from 50 cents to one dollar per thousand.

CINCINNATI, June 28. The steamer Phateon while racing with the steamer Handy, this afternoon at 1 o'clock, exploded her boiler and the boat was blown to pieces.
