Notes and Comments.

The proposal is made in Minneapolis to have vegetables bought and sold by weight instead of dry measure.

The New Bedford Journal remarks: "When Erastus Wiman speaks on this side of the line he tells his hearers that reciprocity is only a step towards annexation."

The tricks of the "Head Centre" of the Oppositionists are being found out.

A Halifax paper advocates the supply of gas by the city as well as water. It finds out that Philadelphia manufactures her own gas, sells it to the consumers at 74 cents per 1,000 feet, and lights her streets on the profits; and that Manchester, England, manufactures her own gas, sells it to consumers at 50 cents per 1,000 feet, and has a very large cash profit.

A Toronto despatch states that the possibilities of a good English egg trade are stirring up dealers there. They declare that if Canadian eggs can command the 24 cents given for the experimental shipment it would have paid Ontario holders better to send them to England than to have sent them into the United States before the McKinley bill came into force.

Everyone in Ottawa is talking about the firm stand taken by the press correspondents in refusing to accept the tardy, and indifferent invitation extended them to attend the banquet tendered the Earl of Aberdeen at the Russell house.

The Horseman, of Chicago, remarks: "It is not an exaggeration to say that in none of our states is the breeding interest becoming more firmly established and making greater comparative progress at present than in Canada."

The movement is general all along the line, from the sandstone headlands that are washed by the Gulf of St. Lawrence to the boundless plains of the Great Lone Land. Many parts of the Eastern provinces are as admirably adapted to the breeding business as the rich province of Ontario, the better sections of which in agricultural wealth will compare favorably with any of the States.

The Jamaica Exposition.

CANADA HAS THE LARGEST SPACE AND WILL HAVE BY ALL ODDS THE MOST VARIED EXHIBIT OF PRODUCTS.

A despatch reports that Jamaicans are astonished, not only with the progress made with the buildings and grounds of the exposition, but with the prospect of success. Old residents are amazed at the great variety of home exhibits and the vast and hitherto unexpected resources of the island.

Seventeen foreign countries will exhibit, but Canada has the largest space, and will probably have the most varied exhibit, as the Dominion Government and the Canadian merchants are alive to the fact that the renaissance of Jamaica means a vast extension of trade with us and the Islands adjoining.

Rain, Gale and High Tide.

Two Hampden (Me.) farmers recently gave a travelling doctor who agreed to cure them of all ills, their notes for \$30 a piece. The medicine left by the doctor proved to be tomato catsup, and the notes have come to the banks for collection.

Albert W. Oxhard, treasurer of the Johnstown Lumber Company of Pittsburg, Pa., is missing. It is alleged that he is short \$7,000 in his accounts. It is also said that he has outstanding debts between \$60,000 and \$70,000.

The Corn Cob Club is the latest social development in Chicago. The only qualification for membership is that all those elected must smoke corn cob pipes in lieu of cigars, the club being intended as a protest against the increased price of cigars caused by the McKinley bill.

In the nine months just ended 289,013 immigrants have been landed on the threshold of the United States, which goes the record of that length of time in any year since 1885—48,456 better. The August and September monthly records were also the largest for five years, being 27,594 and 32,224 respectively.
