Harry Hirsch's new \$4,000 pacer, Peach Butter, with a three-year-old record of 2:10, recently purchased from Reed Bros., Fort Fairfield, Maine, showed he had the goods at Sydney in his first start. He won the 4th race from Jerry Lee Volo, Th. Wilkin, Ensign Joe, Cyclonic and Ohio Hal in 2:13 3/5 and the 8th race from the same field in 2:12. At no time was he out and the 3,000 fans, according to the press, "were open-mouthed at the sight of the beautiful dark chestnut pacing gelding beating the daylight out of a barrel of favorites in the featured pace."

The recently imported Adam's Orphan, driven by the veteran reinsman Charlie Sweet, won the second race from Peter at Courthouse in 2:15 but in the 6th race Peter Court, driven by Rannie MacDonald, was out in front with Resourceful (Mauger), May Harvester (J. MacDonald) second and third, time 2:16. Peter at Courthouse was sired by Peter Henley 2:02, a horse of wonderful stamina and wearing qualities which he has handed down to his get, many of which raced in the Maritimes with great success, particularly the pacer Ray Henley 2:03 1/2. Peter started racing as a three-year-old in 1939 and has been at it—often winter and summer—ever since and always giving a good account of himself.

Some years ago he was shifted to the trot and won quite a number of races and placings at that gait at which he took a record of 2:15 1/2. His best mark pacing is 2:11 1/2. Hats off to Peter at Courthouse. Lillian Budlong continues to make good for new owners in Sydney, being first in the 3rd race to Lee Budlong (R. MacDonald) and 2nd in the 7th race to the same horse. She is being nicely handled by driver Campbell.

Harry Hirsch has sold his free for all pacer Little Brown G. 4, 2:06 3/5 by Chief Counsel 1:57 1/2, to R. J. Logue of Sydney. Prior to being sold Little Brown G. had won both his starts at Sydney and paced the fastest mile there this season—2:11 2/5. We trust the new owner will have every success with his purchase as it is always good news to us to learn that the ranks of owners are being increased in the Maritimes.

The opening night's races at Woodstock went over big and the five-year-old pacer Jo Jo Spencer, that took a record of 2:12 last year and is owned by William Coker of Woodstock, entered the 2:10 list—the first in the Maritimes to do so. Congratulations also to Don McNeill, Summerside, who is now the driver for the Smith Stable, for winning with Lil Frisco, that reduced her record to 2:16 1/2.

The night racing program at Charlottetown track Wednesday was voted by all present as an excellent one. The track and grounds looked lovely, particularly the centre field which the recent rains have covered with a luxuriant growth of grass. Noble performances there were that of the trotter Mary Merk (E. Semple) in winning the first heat in 2:14, lowering her record by four-fifths of a second. She seemed to do so easily that a very fast mark is predicted for her. Miss Knox (I. O'Meara) hung up the 1951 record for this Province with 2:11 1/5 in winning the 6th dash, with the nifty Silk Hal (James McGregor) right at her bulky wheel. Silk Hal turned the tables on Miss Knox in the 10th dash, winning in 2:13 1/5.

One of the closest trotting contests seen here in a long time was the 8th dash in which Nell Kalmuck (W. Kelly) and Jennie Kalmuck (C. O'Donnell) raced practically as a team for two-thirds of a mile. Nell's nose showed a few inches in front at the finish in 2:15 1/2. There were a lot of surprises, one in particular was that the win of J. S. J. splendidly driven by owner H.B. Willis in the second dash. Most of us did not give him any kind of a chance but he

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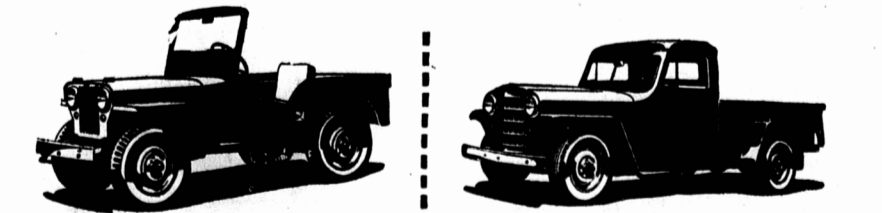
