

# Lewisville Cubs Make It Three Straight With 2-1 Victory Over C. And B.

The Lewisville Cubs made it three straight in their best-of-seven series with the Curran & Briggs ball club at the Queen Elizabeth ball park yesterday afternoon, defeating the home town team by the close score of 2-1. The Curranites out-hit their rivals ten times to five, but did not produce with men in scoring position, and as a result left twelve runners, stranded on the sacks.

Jack Kearns pitched another fine ball game in a losing cause, setting the Lewisville hickory wielders down with five safe blows and striking out eleven. He accounted for the only run scored by this team, polling out a home run to left centre field in the second inning, and shared batting honors with Brian Lewis and Maurice Cannon. Kearns hit for 4, Cannon 2 for 4 and Lewis 2 for 5. In the sixth inning Kearns hit a longer ball than his circuit clout but St. Pierre, playing deep in centre field, went back to the street to gather his fly in.

St. Pierre got a freak hit off the plate in the fifth inning, its quality attested to by the fact that Dodger scout Bill O'Connor, who was at the game, saying he had never seen a play just like it before. Kearns threw a pitch behind the back of St. Pierre, a left-handed hitter, and the batter wheeled around and hitting the opposite way laid it down along the third base line for the daddy of all scratch hits.

Laurier Cormier started on the mound for the visitors and yielded six hits and the lone tally before he retired in the seventh inning with two out and two runners, whom he had walked on bases. Bob Fougere, the no-hitter of the Maritimes, took over the pitching burden from there, and although Curran & Briggs collected 4 hits off his southpaw slants, they were not able to score any runs. Mullins, Cub right fielder, was the only Lewisville hitter to get a brace of safe blows. All the runs were earned and the three bobbles made in the game were not costly.

In the seventh inning Lewisville scored both their runs. LeBlanc, the first batter, walked and Trites, the boy who hit the home run in the first game at Lewisville, belted a triple scoring LeBlanc. St. Pierre whiffed, but Cormier's high bouncer went through the mound to Coke Grady and the shortstop didn't have a chance to choke off the winning run at the plate.

Paul Schurman, C. & B. catcher, caught two runners trying to steal second, and McCleaghlan, his rival backstop, had one vice-sack. Only one base was stolen, Maurice Cannon turning the trick in the fourth frame.

## Marciano Solid 4-To-1 Favorite In Bout Tonight

NEW YORK. (AP)—Rocky Marciano, heavyweight champion of the world exactly one year Wednesday, remained a solid 4-to-1 favorite to turn back the challenge of Roland LaStarza Thursday night before 32,000 boxing fans at the Polo Grounds.

New York's first heavyweight title fight in 2 1/2 years scheduled for 10:30 p.m. EDT will not be seen on home television. There will be no blow-by-blow radio accounts although radio stations will be permitted to broadcast brief summaries at the end of each round.

A television network will carry the 15-round match to 45 theatres and drive-ins by theatre TV which has guaranteed the International Boxing Club a minimum of \$100,000.

Expect 32,000

The forecasts call for about 32,000 at the Polo Grounds and a gross gate of about \$350,000. Jim Norris, IBC president, said advance receipts were "over \$250,000" with a chance of a final gate of \$400,000 or better. The weather man predicted a clear warm day with a high of 70 and the high 50s by ringtime.

## Consider Diet For Jet Pilots

OTTAWA. (CP)—Dietary experiments are being held in Canada to ascertain the effect of various foods on jet fighter pilots. The RCAF's medical chief said Wednesday.

Air Commodore A. A. G. Corbet added that it is too early to say yet what action the air force will take as a result of the experiments.

He was commenting on a Washington dispatch that combat flyers in Korea have been adversely affected by their diet.

"We know the problem is there," he said. "But so far our boys who have been on loan to the U.S. Air Force have not complained."

The Washington report said that digestive gas generated by combat zone meals has interfered with the flying and fighting ability of Sabre jet pilots in Korea.

It stated further that a squadron fed a special diet of non-gas-forming foods averaged 4.2 times as many claims of success against enemy planes as did pilots in two other squadrons fed regular mess-hall fare.

Air Commodore Corbet said the present experiments were ordered after an extensive survey into the pre-flight, in-flight and post-flight feelings of jet pilots. He said the results may be known in about two months.

At that time, he added, it may be necessary to introduce special measures to offset or prevent any harmful reaction to a pilot's diet.

## Gives Formula For Telling Canadians Apart

REGINA. (CP)—Premier Douglas has a formula for telling Canadians apart.

He produced it Tuesday in an address to the Canadian Chamber of Commerce here.

Maritimers, Mr. Douglas said, are rugged, sturdy men with "granite chins". He quoted a Maritime member of Parliament as saying that the Maritime Provinces were the "finest place in the world" . . . and that Maritimers ate more fish than anyone else and "fish make brains."
