Early Catches Of Herring Encouraging

ALBERTON — Ice-free shores enabled Alberton and Tignish fishermen to run out a few herring nets and small but encouraging catches were landed Monday and Tuesday mornings.

One Alberton fisherman landed three crates yesterday morning and larger catches are expected today with many more nets set out.

Some of the herring were disposed of to peddlers but most of the catches will be salted down as bait for the spring lobster season which opens May 1 on the north side of the province from Tignish around to Victoria on the south side.

Boats are being launched daily at Tignish and Alberton and the wharves are once again piled high with thousands of lobster traps.

Unusually high prices are expected to result in more fishermen with larger gears than in recent years.
