Be sure you see the harvest moon on Monday night next. It can be seen at its best from the deck of the steamer Jacques Cartier as she plies the waters of Hillsborough Bay. The music of the military bands will make the evening a glorious one, provided unfavorable weather does not prohibit.

CAPTAIN James McKay, of the steamer Olivette which arrived at Halifax Friday, received a despatch before leaving Boston, stating that he had been elected a state senator in Florida. That state is his home. The genial captain got 2,220 votes out of a total of 2,300. He is a staunch Democrat.

CORRECTION.—In our report of the evidence before the Royal Commission James H. Boddin, Esq., is represented as saying "he prefers the new law to a license law if properly carried out." He wishes us to say that his preference as expressed before the commission is that "he considers the police regulation good but high license best of all."

We were shown, Tuesday, by Mr. Chas Patton, of Patton Bros, a relic, over 100 years old—some 140 Chinese coins, in the shape of a dagger, and laced together with colored cord; also three American bank notes dated 1773, 1775 and 1778 respectively. One of these notes was unearthed at Annapolis Royal, N. S., a few years ago. The printing and handwriting are quite visible.

We are glad to learn that the stockholders in the Cliff Mining Company of Montana are receiving very encouraging intelligence from Mr. Maclean, who went from this city to take a position in the mine. Mr. Maclean is an experienced miner and his opinions ought to be of some value. Under date of August 13th he writes as follows:—

"Indications in the tunnel now lead us to believe the vein is not far off. I got some fine ore in the shaft. It is rich and looks better than what you took east. It is steel galena and will run from eighty to ninety dollars in silver. They are all feeling good about the prospect. I think you are going to have very rich ore when we get into the vein."

The shaft from which Mr. Maclean is taking the ore referred to was sunk in the vein of ore perpendicularly about 35 ft. This shaft was sunk to test the ore at the surface. A tunnel is now being driven into the side of the mountain upon which the mine is situated, and it will be good news to those interested to learn that it is so near completion and that the outlook is so promising.

The following letter from the publisher of the American Horse Breeder to Principal Miller of the Ch'town Business College is self explanatory. We congratulate the publisher of the Horse Breeder on securing the services of Prof. Miller as P. E. Island editor of his paper.

King's County Temperance Alliance.

A meeting of the King's County Temperance Alliance was held in the Temperance Hall, Montague, August 10th, Rev. D. C. McKay, president of the Alliance, in the chair. Twelve churches and ten temperance societies were represented by delegates. There were nine clergymen in the meeting.

The following items of business transacted may be mentioned:

A vote of thanks was presented to Rev. Father William Phelan for his valuable services in the cause of temperance.

An offer made by Premier Peters to the president of the Alliance in which it was proposed that the government pay the temperance people a certain sum of money, that the temperance people do the prosecuting and receive all fines under the Scott Act, the government to look after appeal cases, was discussed and disposed of in the following resolutions:

Resolved: That the King's County Temperance Alliance highly recommend the action of Attorney General Peters, in his justice in putting the Scott Act in force since his assumption of office.

Resolved, That Premier Peters' offer to the temperance people of King's County, contained in his letter, to our President, be not accepted.

There are now two Scott Act prosecutions in King's County receiving Government pay. The temperance people are dissatisfied with both of them and called for their dismissal, but the Government refused to dismiss them unless some valid and reasonable charges were made against them. To meet the requirements of the situation, the Alliance appointed a committee, composed of Revs. W. Phelan and W. H. Spencer, to receive charges against the prosecutors and transmit the same to the Attorney General, together with the names of persons recommended by the Alliance for prosecutors.

On motion the thanks of the Alliance were tendered to the ladies of the W. C. T. U. for their work in the temperance cause.
