Sir Winston To Receive Award

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (AP)—Sir Winston Churchill will be the first recipient of a new Williamsburg award that will honor brave and inspired men of freedom.

Creation of the award was announced Sunday by trustees of Colonial Williamsburg, the Rockefeller-backed organization that has carried on the multi-million-dollar restoration of this historical city of the American revolution. The award will consist of an honorarium of \$10,000 and a symbolic town crier's bell. Churchill will receive the gifts at a ceremony to be held in London, probably in December.

Winthrop Rockefeller, chairman of the trustees of Colonial Williamsburg, said the award will be made periodically to "a person who has influenced the course of national or world events significantly by expressing in sustained action or eloquent and persuasive statement a dedication to liberty and justice for all men."

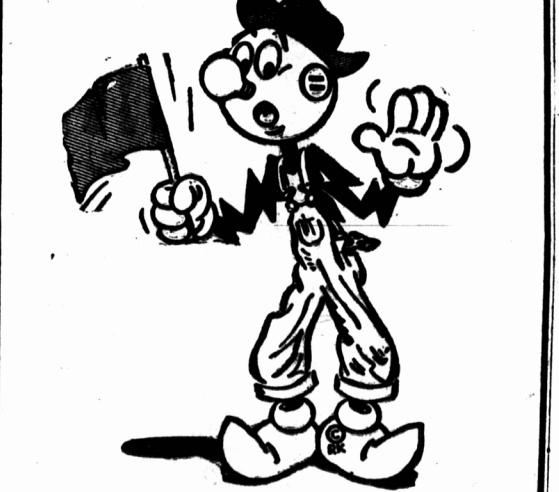
