Funeral Services On Monday For Late Dr. J. A. MacPhee

SUMMERSIDE — The funeral of the late Dr. John Adolphus MacPhee will be held Monday morning from his late residence, 46 Summer Street to St. Paul's Church where Requiem High Mass will be celebrated at 10 o'clock.

The veteran doctor, in failing health for some time, died at the Prince County Hospital early Friday morning.

Born in Charlottetown in 1884, the late doctor attended school in that city and graduated from St. Dunstan's College in 1904. He taught school two years at Souris where he was principal.

He received his medical degree from McGill University in 1910 and, after two years of practice in Kinkora, moved to Summerside where he resided until the time of his death.

Dr. MacPhee served in both World Wars. In the 1914-18 conflict he was active overseas with the Royal Canadian Medical Corps and reached the rank of captain at the time of his discharge.

During the Second World War he commanded a military hospital at Mulgrave, N.S., and also served at New Glasgow and Halifax.

Always active in community affairs, Dr. MacPhee for many years was president of the Children's Aid Society, a member of the school board and a member of the P.E.I. Sanatorium commission.

He was past president of the P.E.I. division of the Canadian Medical Association and for several years a member of the Medical Council of Canada.

During the Second World War he also served as a director of War Services Incorp., and since the war has been honorary president of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion for several years.

Dr. MacPhee was also active in politics. In 1940 he ran in the federal election against C.J.L. Boleston as Prince County candidate for the Progressive Conservative party.

Dr. MacPhee was married in 1914 to the former Mae Caswell, a nurse of Charlottetown, who survives. From this happy union was born 11 children two of whom predeceased him. Bernice died in 1927 at the age of 2½ years and Ernest was killed in action with the Canadian Army in Italy in 1944.
