

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

THE CARRIAGE.—The steamer Carroll left Port Hawkesbury at 2.30 o'clock this morning and will arrive here this evening.

COLD WAVE COMING.—The temperature at Windsor on Saturday night was from ten to twenty below the freezing point. The cold wave is moving east.

THE GLEANER.—The surviving steamer Gleaner, which has been on the slip at Pictou being painted, arrived here last evening to "lay up" for the winter.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.—Mr. Arthur Mellish read an interesting and instructive paper entitled "Charity as a question of practical ethics," before the Epworth League last evening. A discussion followed. Mr. G. F. Beer presided.

A GOOD IDEA.—The Manitoba Government intends sending the principal portion of the World's Fair exhibit to the Antwerp exhibition and the Imperial Institute in London. A small portion of it will also go to the San Francisco Midwinter fair.

ACTION FOR DAMAGES.—Notice of action for \$2,000 damages against the town of Digby N. S. has been served on the mayor and town clerk on behalf of Hayes Vantassel as a result of Officer Trask breaking into Vantassel's house, under a Scott act warrant, a day or two since.

AN IMPORTANT DECISION.—The appeals committee of the Methodist Church, in session at Toronto, have come to a decision ruling that the president of the Nova Scotia conference in admitting women as members was wrong. They hold that women cannot be members of the conference.

DISASTROUS RESULTS.—A farmer named David Wilcox, living near Charlton, Ont., sank a well in his cellar a few days ago. A natural gas vein was struck and the house filled with the gas. An explosion followed which blew out the doors and windows, hurled the stove through the roof and fatally burned Miss Mary Johnson.

CHEESE AT THE FAIR.—A postal card received last evening from Chicago asks us to note the following correction in the list of exhibits of cheese in the October competition at the World's Fair: Cheese of 1892 scoring 90 points or over is entitled to an award; cheese of 1893 must score 95 points or over for an award.

—St. John Telegraph: The sentence of 14 years in the penitentiary imposed on a man in Charlotte county for poisoning his neighbour's cattle was none too severe. Crimes of this character, which can be committed often without detection, and which exhibit human nature in its worst aspects, merit the most exemplary punishment.

FIRE AT NEWCASTLE.—The L. C. B. coal shed, containing fifteen hundred tons of coal, the wood shed and two hundred and eighty cords of wood, used for starting fires in engines, four gondolas and two box cars were destroyed by fire at Newcastle, N. B., on Sunday morning. The fire started about 24 o'clock in the wood shed. The cause of the fire is not known.

A CO-OPERATIVE FAILURE.—In March, 1892, a co-operative society was organized in Halifax, chiefly out of the employees of the dockyard, under the name of the Halifax Mutual Co-operative Society. At first there were about fifty members, which increased at the end of the first year to seventy. They opened a store, but have not been successful as a society, and are involved in debt. The society is being wound up at the instance of the courts.

REN THE TOWN.—An unknown tramp took charge of Richibucto one day last week, and for the best part of the afternoon practically "ran the town." He assaulted several persons on the street and attacked three or four ladies in their houses before the citizens turned out en masse and ran him into jail. The tramp carried a big knife and a stout club. The sheriff thinks the same tramp was in Kent County last summer, about the time Buck and Jim created the sensation.

MASONIC TEMPLE.—The Masonic Temple Opera House will be opened to the public this evening. The opening ball includes the sparkling comedy, "A Russian Honey-Moon," and a society farce, "The Judge's Decision." Mr. Vinnicombe's orchestra will be present with a choice programme, and every preparation has been made for a most enjoyable evening's entertainment. On Thursday night the ever popular drama "Emerald" will be put upon the boards. Those who have not yet secured their seats should do so at once, as all are especially requested to be in their seats on time.

CHARLES COBLETT MARRIED.—We take the following from the theatrical column of the St. John Sun: Last Tuesday night Charles Coghlan and Miss Beveridge, both members of the Rose Ogilvie Co., were quietly married at Indianapolis. The marriage is a surprise to the theatrical world. Charles Coghlan is fifty-two years old, Miss Beveridge is not yet nineteen. The marriage returns show that Charles Coghlan was born in Paris, France. His place of residence is given as Canada. He gives the maiden name of his mother as Anna Maria Kully. He was never married before, he says in the affidavit. Miss Beveridge was born in Springfield, Ill. She is the Grand-daughter of ex-Governor Beveridge of Illinois, and is possessed of several accomplishments. She has a fine presence and undoubted abilities. She created some surprise in going upon the stage, but was heralded a success from the start. She has youth, beauty, talent and ambition. Her mother has been travelling with her. Mr. Coghlan was the literary executor of Lord Bulwer's estate. He finished two of Bulwer's plays and is the author of several others.
