## Sent To Supreme

It was reported that he worked with County Construction at Kinkora. O'Connor was also working with the company there on Saturday, June 18, with others in car of John MacDonnell witness left for home. Cross examined, witness said he knew O'Connor only since he had come to work with them. On Saturday he had bought a pint, but didn't know what others had. He knew O'Connor was married but never was at his home. Used to know MacKenzie. "Saw MacKenzie angry only once. I had no trouble with him."

Alfred Moore, also employed with the construction company at Kinkora, said he bought a pint of gin at Borden. "Left liquor in bag with MacDonnell. At Montague O'Connor and I took a taxi to Cardigan where O'Connor bought two pints. Came back to Harry Stewart's. O'Connor left; said he was not going up street to buy shoes."

Cross examined, witness said he knew O'Connor since May. He seemed a nice fellow to work with. Did not discuss domestic relations with him.

Joseph Vuozzo, Montague, testified to seeing O'Connor on Saturday, June 18. "He asked me to give him a Whim Road. Took him to the home of Alfred Moore. He appeared under the influence of liquor. He couldn't get his truck started so gave him a push to road. I did not think he was fit to drive. I left him on the road and came home." He did not know O'Connor, and had done no business with him previously.

Const. William A. Wilson, R.C.M.P., Charlottetown, a member of highway traffic patrol between Montague and Murray River, testified that on June 18, about 10:30, met vehicle going fast. "Crowd of people gathered around and followed. Instantly he stopped. It was Elmer O'Connor. He said he was on his way to a doctor, and brakes had. Gave vehicle a check-up and found no brakes. Advised him he would be charged for not having brakes. Saw stains on hands and saw cut on head. Said he was having trouble with his wife's neck. He said he had a fight with him, and his wife had struck him on the head. I had to go to Souris; gave him a slip. Detected slight odor of liquor. Thought O'Connor was sober."

Cross examined: Saw cut but was not bleeding. Collar of shirt was stained. Said wife had struck him with axe.

Cross examined: "Went to MacKenzie's about 11 p.m. Found large axe on June 21, found hand axe previously. Did not know if axe owned by axe. Did not know if O'Connor on 19th. He said MacKenzie had come to gate with axe. Went later and found axe."

# Visit Proved Delightful To Japanese Ambassador

Mr. Koto Matsudaira

My country is anxious to establish a greater trade balance with Canada," said His Excellency, Koto Matsudaira, Japanese Ambassador to Canada in an interview with a Guardian reporter yesterday just before he left the Province for a visit in the State of Maine.

The mild mannered diplomat pointed out that trade relations with Canada which is the nearest country of the Western world to Japan, have improved greatly during the last two years, having changed from a ratio of 11-1 to 5-1. He would like, however, to see trade on an even more favourable basis.

His Excellency said that Japan was the second largest importer of wheat and barley from Canada. He felt that such articles as cameras, chinaware, toys and textiles could be purchased at advantage from his country.

During his stay on the Island where he was a guest at the Charlottetown Hotel, the Ambassador lost no time in making himself familiar with the Island countryside. He was impressed with the fertility of the soil and the condition of the Island cattle herds. He admitted that he had never heard of Prince Edward Island before coming to Ottawa but expressed a keen desire to revisit here at some other time.

When told that several Islanders have spent some time in Japan, His Excellency was greatly impressed, expressing regret that his stay was not longer so that he would have an opportunity of meeting some of these people.

With 23 years behind him in the diplomatic service of his country, the still youthful looking ambassador recalled that he had spent seven years in Paris and had served in Geneva, Moscow and Washington, D. C., before coming to Canada.

His service in Moscow was during the war and for eight months following J-Day he was interned by the Russians. His Excellency

was pleased with the informal talks he had with the Governor and Premier of the Province, adding: "I am the first Japanese Ambassador to visit your Province and am therefore the first to establish diplomatic relations between my country and Prince Edward Island."

## Plan Installation Of Heating System In Sheds On Summerside Wharf

Specifications for the installation of a heating plant in the west yatchouse located on the Railway Wharf, Summerside, to provide adequate winter heat for the recently built sheds, were revealed yesterday by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries.

The project will consist of the erection of a boiler house, the installation of a steam boiler in it, and the installation of a heating system in the west warehouse. The boiler house will contain two steel tanks with a capacity of 500 gallons each and an automatic steam boiler of a capacity adequate to heat both the west and east warehouses to a temperature of 40 degrees. The work will also include all necessary plumbing and wiring in both the warehouse and boiler house.

Omission of a heating system for the wharf-sheds was noticed some time ago by Mr. MacNaught who immediately applied to Federal Minister of Public Works R. H. Winters for the addition of the system.—S

## North Korean Red Asks For Asylum
