Court Shows Leniency, Light Penalty Imposed

Richard Darrell Casford of Charlottetown was given 30 days in Queens County Jail for break entry and theft into MacKay's Store in Stanley Bridge, July 17, 1964 when he appeared in Supreme Court yesterday. The sentence was handed down before a full bench comprised of Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, Mr. Justice R.R. Bell and Mr. Justice G.J. Tweedy.

Before he is released the accused must enter into recognizance in the sum of \$1,000, with two sureties of \$500 each. He must also keep the peace and be of good behavior for a period of two years from the date of recognition and during that period report to the provincial probation officer on the first Monday of each month and also maintain himself in gainful employment for the two year period whenever it is available. Each month when the accused reports to the probation officer he must pay him \$10 until the \$128.96 compensation to Kenneth MacKay is paid in full.

The Crown was represented by Mark McGuigan and C.R. McQuaid acted for the accused. In addressing the court Mr. McQuaid said he realized the record of the accused was not all it might be. He stated that the accused is not quite 18 years of age and that family circumstances for him have not always been good. He said that the unlawful act had not been committed by an individual but by a group and unhappy family circumstances may have led him to association with the wrong type of person.

Mr. McQuaid said that when the accused had been acquitted by a lower court he had left the province and obtained employment in Toronto with a candy manufacturing company. He then produced a letter from the ex-employer of the accused stating the accused had shown eagerness to learn the trade that he was given a raise in pay in about three months and also that he was found to be dependable and trustworthy.

Since the accused returned to the province last weekend the John Howard Society had taken an interest in him. Mr. McQuaid

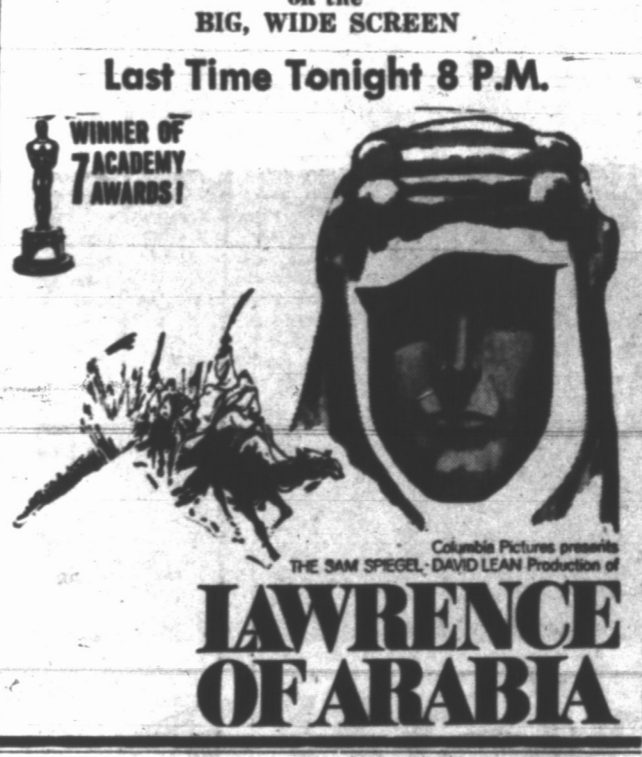
