### 100 Top Steers Landed For Easter Show, Sale

One hundred steers have been entered in the Easter Best Show and Sale here March 28 and 29, it was learned Tuesday from David Peacock, provincial department of agriculture fieldman, who is show and sale secretary.

An entry list of this size will mean that there will be approximately 50 to 65 steers in the show, after the culling, which is done each year to ensure that only top quality animals will face the judge and auctioneer.

#### EXCELLENT STEERS

Several prominent beef breeders have observed that there are some excellent steers being fitted for the show, Dave Ford, North River, who took the grand championship ribbon several years ago, is reported to be fitting a top Hereford steer again this year, and his neighbor, Tom Sanderson, is fitting an Angus steer that has taken the eye of those who have dropped in at the Sanderson barn for a look.

The Sanders own a breed Hereford cattle, but this is a steer that Mr. Sanderson purchased to fit for the show and sale.

But, as Mr. Peacock said this morning, the grand champion could come from an entirely different herd. Last year, Boyd Dixon, Clyde River, made his mark when he won the grand championship award, and the top prize of the sale, which is even more acceptable, with one of his Angus steers. Top price has been running around \$1,400 in recent years.

Leo McIsaac, president of the Breeders' association, said today there are some splendid steers being fitted for the big show, after a weekend trip to barns of some of the better known breeders.

The show will be judged by J.K. Sibbald, Toronto, who is chief livestock buyer for Swift Canadian Company, Claude Craswell, Winsloe, is the auctioneer.

### APEC Directors Suggest Market Research Plan

A program of market research on Prince Edward Island products by the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council seems likely following discussion at the APEC directors meeting Monday at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Following an extensive discussion of marketing research, the directors agreed to recommend to the APEC executive committee that such a program be undertaken. Taking part in the discussion were: W. H. Weight, deputy minister of agriculture, and Reid Sangster, director of marketing.

The proposed program would undertake to determine the present position of Island products in the traditional markets and to identify new areas of expansion.

R. P. Boutlier, APEC membership and public relations officer, said yesterday that he approved by the executive committee meeting March 20, that the program would be moving in a few weeks.

He emphasized that the program was undertaken on an commodity basis rather than an overall picture, and would be a continuing study with regular updating of information.

The directors are particularly interested in expanding sales in the Caribbean, New England States, and western Europe, especially Great Britain, he said.

He also noted that the proposed study is in keeping with the general program of APEC for expansion of regionally produced goods at home and abroad. The work would be extensive to be conducted on a volunteer basis and would therefore be a

### Court Hears Off of Chase in Legal Spirits Case

Frederick B. Dooley and John H. Reid of Charlottetown, charged with the possession of illegal spirits, were remanded to March 6 by Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court yesterday after evidence was given against Mr. Dooley by Crown witness Capt. W. Wilson of the Charlottetown detachment of the RCMP.

Capt. Wilson testified that on the night of Feb. 15, he, along with Const. John Cooke, in an unmarked car, did pursue a blue van through Charlottetown and catch it at the corner of Queen and Water Streets.

Upon searching the van, which he said was occupied by Mr. Reid and Mr. Dooley, Const. Wilson discovered two men in the liquid on the floor. He obtained a sample of this liquid and arrested the two men. The sample was sent to Ottawa for analyzing and was found to contain a large amount of ethyl alcohol, identifying it as moonshine.

This sample was entered as evidence.

### Story in Guardian Aids Ancestor Hunt

A story in The Guardian last week has been credited with giving Vernon Johnson of Erie, Pennsylvania a most certain proof that his family's ancestors were Smallwoods.

Mr. Johnson, 28, an equipment dealer, said his grandfather was Claude Stewart of Charlottetown on March 4, 1871. He was given the name of William Johnson or John Johnson.

However, few of them could remember anything of the brother William except that he left the island around the turn of the century and did not come back.

### Tournament Is Cancelled

NEW YORK (AP) — The 1963 Golden Gloves boxing tournament, sponsored by the New York Daily News, has been cancelled because of the prolonged printers' strike.

The Daily News Welfare Association, making the announcement Tuesday, said the event would be resumed in 1964.

Dates for the tournament all ready have been set, with the finals scheduled at Madison Square Garden March 18, 1964.

This marks the first break in the amateur boxing tournament since it was started in 1927.

The Chicago Tribune announced Feb. 28 that the Golden Gloves Tournament of Champions, sponsored by the Tribune, since 1929, would be discontinued after this year.

The Tribune said the reasons were the financial burden involved in the tournament and also the Amateur Athletic Union's insistence that all boxers must wear helmets.

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### Dief Charged With Watching Rail Interests

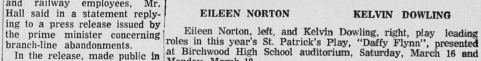
MONTREAL (CP) — Frank Hall, chief negotiator for Canada's 100,000 non-operating railway employees, said Tuesday Prime Minister Diefenbaker's primary concern over railway branch line abandonment is "with the interests of the railway companies."

There is "little evidence" of Mr. Diefenbaker's concern for farmers, a rail organization and railway employees, Mr. Hall said in a statement issued by a press release issued by the prime minister concerning branch-line abandonments.

In the release, made public in Winnipeg Monday, Mr. Diefenbaker said the Conservative government intends to set up a special fund to pay railway losses suffered while operating uneconomic branch lines pending their abandonment.

It said the government does not intend to permit lines to be abandoned except under a plan recognizing "the existing interests of farmers and business of the areas served."

The plan would be long term and could last until 1970.
