A GROWING TOWN.—The town of Moncton is growing very rapidly. According to the figures given by the assessors this year's valuation is \$2,035,000, against \$1,350,000 in 1889. The railway, church, and city property, together with exempted factories, swell the total valuation to about \$4,000,000.

ANOTHER FIRE.—The Journal says: On Tuesday night, 20th inst., about 11 or 12 o'clock, a house and barn belonging to Mr. Reuben Gallant, Carleton, Lot 6, was burned to ashes. The building had been unoccupied since June last. The origin of the fire is unknown, but is supposed to have been the work of an incendiary. Mr. Gallant estimates his loss at \$400. No insurance.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Grave Consequences Feared.

HALIFAX, May 28.

The steamer Harlow arrived at midnight from the French shore of Newfoundland. Capt Farquhar reports that the people of Bay St. George are terribly excited over the action of the commander of the French warship at that place. On the 23rd inst., he ordered all British subjects at that place to remove all their nets, fishing gear, etc., from the waters of that bay, as French fishermen wanted to fish there. The people of Bay St. George are only partially armed, and have no adequate means to cope with the marines, bluejackets and heavy cannon of the French warships. They prevented bloodshed and the destruction of their property by obeying the order, but a very bitter feeling exists. The people are furious at being abandoned by Great Britain and compelled to submit to the armed forces of a foreign power, and at being driven from their homes, because fishing is the sole means of existence on that coast.

The Wages of Sin.

NORTH ADAMS, Mass., May 28.

Mag Shea, a notoriously dissolute woman who had been keeping house for Nick Bradley, a negro, near Stamford Village, V. T., was persuaded by John Dilworth, living about two miles from Stamford to leave Bradley and keep house for him. She came on Sunday, and that night Bradley and some friends came to the house frightened Dilworth out and remained there until Tuesday, drinking cider, holding carousal and breaking dishes and furniture. On Tuesday morning, the woman died. By evidence adduced at the inquest to-day, Bradley tried to persuade her to return to his house, and she refused. Whereupon he stabbed her to the heart. Bradley and three other men found in the house were arrested and held for the grand jury.

News From Halifax.

HALIFAX, May 28.

The re-count in Hants County resulted in the return of Dr. Haly (Govt), by a majority of one over McDougall, who was previously reported elected.

The Buenos Ayrean, from St. John's, brought 100 immigrants from Newfoundland.

The Newfoundland constable that was abducted by the French fishing vessel Marie was placed on Red Island, from which place he was rescued by the French warship Indre and returned to his home at Port Aupas.

The Whelan-Picaud Scandal.

QUEBEC, May 28.

At yesterday's meeting of the Cabinet Mr. Beique Q. C., of Montreal, a strong local government party man, was appointed a Royal Commissioner to investigate the Whelan-Picaud scandal. Beique is armed with power to send for persons and papers and to examine witnesses under oath.

Hon. F. Langlier is retained to represent the Government in this enquiry, which, it is said will be commenced immediately.

The Application Considered.

OTTAWA, May 28.

The application of the town of Moncton for leave to open the streets across the Intercolonial track was considered by the Railway Committee to-day. Chief Engineer Schreiber having reported adversely, and no one being present on behalf of the application, it was not entertained.

The executive council this afternoon re-appointed George S. Merrill insurance commissioner.

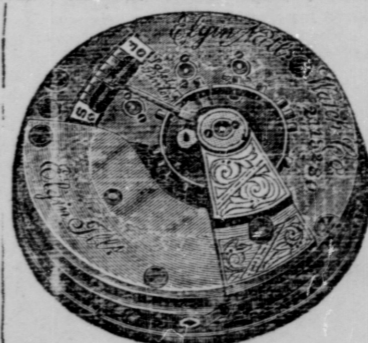
