Sonny Liston And Cassius Clay Sign For Title Bout

DENVER (AP)—Sonny Liston the former champion, and Cassius Clay, the gobby challenger, scribbled their names Tuesday on a contract for a multi-million dollar heavyweight title fight in mid-February, probably in Las Vegas.

Former heavyweight champion Joe Louis put in a bid at the contract signing with Los Angeles interests, guaranteeing \$1 million for the fight.

Jack Liston, Liston's advisor, said that was the biggest offer that has been received to stage the fight. Liston said other cities that have submitted bids are Minneapolis, Chicago, Miami and Las Vegas.

Louis said he was putting in the proposal for United World Enterprises, Inc. Also present was George Parassous of the Olympic Boxing club of Los Angeles.

The contract signing had its theatrical moments as Clay tried to hog the scene with noisy spouting.

SUMS UP FEELINGS
Liston, sitting calmly and at times looking a little bored at the noisy challenge, summed up his feelings with the declaration: "I hope you look the same when I get done with you."

Officials for Intercontinental Promotions, Inc. — Liston's group—said they expected the bout to gross between \$6 million and \$8 million, a record for any bout.

Liston's fight last year in Chicago in which he took the crown from Floyd Patterson grossed about \$5.5 million, Ben Bentley, publicity director for Intercontinental, said.

Clay will get 25 per cent of the gross, compared with the 12 1/2 per cent Liston got in his first fight with Patterson. Liston, an officer in Intercontinental, will get 40 per cent.

Come overtones laced the contract signing at a downtown hotel. Clay monopolized the early minutes by demanding a seat away from Liston.
